Citizens have been generous in donating automobiles for the accommodation of the guests, making it possible for the cars to be arranged in the above order.

Numbered pennants will be placed upon each car by the committee in charge and name tags with the number of the car for each member of the local committee to correspond with numbered name tags for guests arriving, which will be distributed on the train before their arrival.

The route will be from the Northern Pacific station east on Main to Sixth street to the Capitol, stopping for a few minutes at the Sakakawea station, South on Sixth street to Avenue F, west on Avenue F to Fourth street, south on Fourth street to Avenue B, west on Avenue B to Country Club, parking in regular order according to number. Cars will be needed at 8 p. m. to take guests to Auditorium, where they will again park in regular order on Broadway south of Auditorium, facing south to avoid turning.

At about 10:15 they will proceed via Broadway west to Fifth street, and south on Fifth street to Northern Pacific station, along which route colored lights will be displayed after the speaking at the Auditorium until the special train departs at 11 p. m.

It is requested that all drivers of cars have cars in perfect order, and equipped with chains in case of bad weather, also that they keep four car lengths apart all of the time and in regular order.
