WHEAT PRICES TAKE DOWNWARD SWING

Bearish Advices From Argentine Cause Grain to Take Slight Tumble

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Peace rumors and bearish advices regarding the Argentine crop outlook resulted today in a series of downward swings in the value of wheat. The market closed heavy, 2 3/4c net lower, with December at 1.57 1/2c to 1.57 1/2c and May at 1.57 1/2c to 1.57 1/2c. Corn finished 3/4c to 1 1/2c off, and oats down 3/4c to 1/2c.

Suggestions of a likelihood of show-ers in Argentina made the wheat bulls uneasy from the start, as heretofore no sign had been reported of a break-up of the drought, which has been forcing Europeans of late to enlarge buying in the United States. Incredibly as to the truth of the peace rumors prevented wheat from breaking much beyond ordinary limits except in the case of the July option, in which trading, as yet, is relatively light. For a brief interval July was down just six cents a bushel. Corn sympathized with the weakness of wheat. Oats although at first displaying independent strength, finally shared in the depression of other grains.

FINANCIAL MARKET SHOWS DEPRESSION

Rumors of Peace Negotiations Responsible for Dipping Prices of Stock

New York, Oct. 6.—Rumors of a renewal of peace negotiations, which seemed to receive credit in high financial quarters, were effective in depressing prices in the stock market later dealing today, after much previous uncertainty and hesitation. Values declined two, three and even five points from top levels of the forenoon, the selling being the most precipitate of any recent session, with some nominal rallies at the close. Total transactions amounted to 1,370,000 shares, of which thirty percent occurred in the first hour. Prior to the final period, the list had shown numerous cross currents, former leaders losing some ground, with greater activity in minor rails and a few industrials of recent prominence, such as the sugar crop, Central Leather and American Hide and Leather preferred, and fertilizer, and chemicals, zinc shares, and rubber stocks.

Extreme gains in secondary rails and some of the specialties referred to ranged from two to four points with Denver & Rio Grande preferred, Western Maryland preferred, Chicago & Alton, Chicago Great Western, Wash, and Kansas City Southern preferred, the most conspicuous features.

Those who regard the foreign exchange markets as an infallible barometer of peace overtures extracted little comfort from that quarter. German remittances which should strengthen the first signs of peace, were slightly heavier and France also shaded with no change in rates to London.
