WHEAT PRICES HIT A SLUMP

STOCK MARKET STILL SHAKY

Value of Grain Drops 1 to 1 1/2 Cents; December Closes at \$1.58 1/8

Chicago, Oct. 11.—Wheat values weakened today largely on account of reports that heavy purchasing in Australia by the British government would divert ships away from the United States. The market closed unsettled, 1c to 1 1/2c net lower, with December at \$1.58 1/8 and May at \$1.57 1/2. Corn lost 1/4c to 3/8c and oats 1/4c to 3/8c. The outcome for provisions was unchanged to 3 1/2c higher.

Pressure Indicates That Submarine Scare Is Still in Evidence

New York, Oct. 11.—Extreme susceptibility to liquidation and pressure today indicated that the stock market was still suffering from the shock of the early week, when prices fell from five to fifteen points on the news of German submarine operations. Gross declines today of two to five points were registered by many of the more speculative issues, while representative shares yielded from one to three points.

Lowest quotations were registered in the final hour, that period witnessing the heaviest selling of the session. Operations for the decline were accompanied by disquieting reports and rumors.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF CITY COMMISSIONERS.

October 10, 1916.

The board of city commissioners met pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Commissioners Bertsch, Kirk and President Lucas.

Minutes of meeting held the 2nd inst. were read and approved.

Mr. H. R. Berndt, by the auditor, stated that he wished to withdraw the petition heretofore presented asking for the opening of an alley in Block 16, N. P. Add.

The matter of the nuisance created by noise of Capital Bowling Alley was brought up by Commissioner Kirk and the auditor directed to notify Mr. Murphy that the nuisance complained of should be abated through the courts.

A letter from Fowler & Green of Fargo addressed to the city attorney and complaining of the methods used by the Business Service Company of this city in inducing laborers to come out west and asking for indemnity in certain sums, was read, and the city attorney directed to prepare an ordinance licensing employment agencies and placing them under a bond, the auditor being further directed to notify Fowler & Green of the action of the board.
