**DAILY BATH IS AS GOOD AS FURNACE**

Keep your skin as well as your furnace in good condition if you want to be warm this winter. For when we are cold there are certain blood vessels in the skin which play the roles of storm doors and closing up keep the blood in the inner parts of the body where it stays warm. But if the skin is clogged, dirty and unhealthy these blood vessels cannot properly perform their duties with the result that our bodily heat is allowed to run down. But keeping the skin clean does not mean one piping hot bath a week, say on Saturday night and then not any attention for another week. A cool water bath, preferably a shower, without soap but used every day even in winter time, will not only keep the skin cleaner and healthier, but also more comfortable. The daily bath without soap cleanses without taking too much of the natural lubricant out of the skin. This natural lubricant is the fatty substance brought up to and spread upon the surface of the skin by the sweat glands. The alkali of a strong soap used with an extremely hot water removes, or "cuts" this oil, leaving the surface of the skin dry, harsh and often sensitive. That is why after an extremely hot bath and a thoroughly scrubbing the skin often is irritated by flannels or underwear. But this condition once or twice a week will do no special harm to the skin and therefore one is perfectly safe in taking a hot bath twice a week. The same care should be exercised in washing the face. Many women scrub their face daily with hot water, flesh brush and soap. They labor under the mistaken idea that this is necessary to maintain a good complexion. They fear that dirt will clog the pores if they don't scrub it out. But you can't clog these pores with dirt anymore than you could bubble a fountain.


