# THE MARKETS

## WHEAT REMAINS AT HIGH FIGURES STOCK MARKET IS BROAD AND ACTIVE

### Resumption of Export Buying Strengthens Market, Which Closes Unsettled.

Chicago, Oct. 26.—Resumption of export buying caused a late upturn in the price of wheat today, after the market had displayed much heaviness owing to rains in Argentina, and to the temporary stoppage of foreign demand. The close was unsettled, at the same as yesterday's finish, 1-2c higher, with December at \$1.80 1-2 to \$1.80 3-4, and May \$1.80 3-4. Corn lost 3-8c to 3-4c net; oats 1-4 to 3-8c and provisions 2 1-2 to 7c.

It was not until within 15 minutes of the end of trading that announcement was made of the revival of export business in wheat. All through the previous part of the day, the bulls had been handicapped so severely that rallies, no matter how vigorous, failed to last.

Estimates of the export sales of wheat ran as high as 1,100,000 bushels. In the presence of such a pronounced bullish development, sentiment changed quickly and today's losses entirely disappeared. Increased country offerings proved too much of a burden for the corn market, the late rally in wheat acted only as an offset in part. Oats were upheld to some extent by export inquiry. Scarcity of cars, though, interfered with the acceptance of bids.

### Initiative Derived From Professional Sources; Bethlehem Steel at 642.

New York, Oct. 26.—Like the preceding sessions of the week, today's active, broad and frequently irregular market, derived almost its sole initiative from professional sources, public interest again holding aloof because of impending uncertainties. Trading once more centered largely around secondary and lower priced rails, industrials, and specialties, at gains of from one to three points, and in some instances more. Latest additions to the rank of prominence and strong rails were, Lake Erie and Wheeling & Lake Erie, Chicago Great Western, Texas Pacific, Chicago Southern & Toledo, St. Louis & Western. Favorites of the previous day, like Rock Island and Denver & Rio Grande preferred, were relatively heavy, finally on profit taking.

The final hour, apart from the recurrent activity in sugars, and some of the remote war descriptions, Bethlehem Steel, jumped 27 points to the new record of 642.

United States Steel and related stocks fluctuated within one or two point limits, hardening on the later covering movement. Total sales of stocks amounted to 1,260,000 shares.

The greater heaviness of international war issues, some of which fell to new low records, while others approached their minimum, featured an otherwise strong bond market.
