

### PAVING OPERATIONS RAPIDLY NEAR CLOSE

Last Block of Concrete Will Be Laid Early Next Week—Crushing Rock

Paving operations in district No. 1 are rapidly approaching the final stage for this year. But one more block of the concrete base is to be laid on Broadway, from Sixth street to Seventh, at the Soo passenger station, and it is expected that the spreading of the bitulithic top coat will be commenced by the middle of next week. Ten and one-half blocks of concrete have been laid to date, and there has been only one minor instance of trouble as a result of low temperatures. From twelve to fifteen days will suffice for the work after the bitulithic plant begins operations, as 1,000 square yards, practically an entire block, can be spread in a day.

All of the equipment for the bitulithic plant except the heater is in the city and set up on the Soo right of way, near the round house. The big rock-crusher now is engaged in crushing "niggerheads" for the surface mixture. This stone is picked up along the right of way of the North Soo and delivered here at comparatively little cost. ### COMMITTEE DISCUSSES FINANCIAL SITUATION

Berlin, by wireless, Oct. 26.—The budget committee of the Reichstag and the secretary of the treasury, Count von Rodern, discussed the financial situation today, and the government's policy during the war of consolidating the floating debt, especially treasury notes, in the form of long term loans. Up to the present time, the Reichstag has granted war credit amounting to 54,000,000,000 marks, of which amount 48,000,000,000 marks was expended up to September 30, 37,500,000,000 having been provided by long term loans and the remainder by the sale of treasury bills. In October 250,000,000 marks will be repaid into the imperial treasury for amounts dispersed for relief work.

### COPELAND DENIES HE SHOT BLACK

Defendant in Sensational Galveston Trial Tells Straightforward Story.

Galveston, Texas, Oct. 26.—John Copland, banker, on trial charged with killing William Black, an anti-Catholic lecturer in Marshall, Texas, February 3, 1915, on the witness stand today denied he shot Black.

Copland testified deliberately and with self-possession. He did not once contradict himself.

He displayed to the jury the wound in his abdomen he is said to have received when fired upon by Hall, so far the chief witness for the state.
