LARGE CROWD HEARS NELSON

Grand Forks Gives Senior Senator from Minnesota a Rousing Reception

Grand Forks, N. D., Sept. 28.—Senator Knute Nelson wound up a successful week's campaign here this evening in behalf of the candidacy of Charles Evans Hughes, Senator McCumber and the entire state ticket. Hundreds were turned away, being unable to gain admission to the hall. The Minnesota senior senator in his vigorous style discussed the issues of the campaign. At the close of his address he gave the following interview to a representative of the Tribune: "You may say that I have had large meetings in every town in which I have spoken, and I find a decided sentiment in favor of Charles E. Hughes, and also in favor of Senator McCumber." The senator continued: "You may say further that I have spoken to crowded halls at Cooperstown, Minot, Rugby and Minnewaukan. At the last two places there were more than 300 people who could not gain admittance to the hall, but they stood patiently on the outside throughout my entire argument. "Everything looks good for an overwhelming vote for Hughes in North Dakota. In all my speeches, however, I have confined my discussion to the national issues and have emphasized the necessity of sending good Republican senators and representatives to congress to aid our next president in making the kind of legislation that will benefit the whole people of the United States. I have constantly emphasized the necessity of sending such a man as McCumber back to the senate, as I believe we need him there very badly. I have said nothing against any of the state officers in North Dakota, and do not intend to make any attacks on John Burke or anybody else."

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MANY IMPROVEMENTS FOUND NECESSARY AT STATE REFORM SCHOOL

Many improvements to the state reform school at Mandan are reported as necessary by the board of control in its third biennial report. Repairs to the administration building, new electric wiring and improved sanitary conveniences, costing \$2,000; an adequate sewage disposal system which will cost \$12,000; a new boiler and engine room, \$5,000; a new ice house, \$500; a barn and silo to cost \$2,500; finishing the third floor of the girls' building and other improvements, \$4,500; overhauling the plumbing, \$2,000; additional storage room costing \$2,000; suitable residence for the superintendent, \$4,500; \$600 for a new poultry house; \$500 for a new hog house, \$600 for slaughter house and equipment; a milk house to cost \$400; ventilation for the dairy barn, \$500; additions to the horse barn, \$500; new school books, interior and exterior decorating and a host of other needed improvements and repairs are recommended by the board. School in Bad Shape. Plainly speaking, the reform school in its present condition is a disgrace to the state of North Dakota. There is no more efficient institutional officer in the state, the board of control asserts, than Joseph M. Devine. He is laboring at the reform school under a tremendous handicap, and the board will do its utmost to procure for him the appropriations recommended, which total \$18,000. Among the items which the institution lacks are fire escapes, inside toilets, running water in the girls' building, play-grounds for the girls, gymnasium equipment for the boys, manual training equipment, sidewalks, laundry and tailor shop equipment, and so many other things that one is inclined to wonder that a public institution should ever have been permitted to fall into such a disreputable condition. 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HOUSEWIFE SHOULD GO TO MARKET AND SELECT MEAT, ADVICE OF WOMAN BUTCHER

Cleveland, O., Oct. 28.—"The average American housewife does not know how to get the most of the meat she buys," says Miss Anna Bowden, Cleveland's first woman butcher. "The butcher bill would worry housewives less if they went in person to the markets," she says. Miss Bowden says when women do go to market they trust to the butcher to give them the right cuts. "A woman may say she wants meat for roasting and the butcher may give her the round shoulder, when it should be the round steak, or the round, when it should be the chuck, or the brisket, when it should be the brisket. The butcher should make use of meat bones in cooking soup. That puts flavor into soup and makes it more nourishing. The best soup meats are the plate-piece, or breast rib meat, and the shank. CLAUDE PEOPLES FIRED THE SHOT

His Preliminary Will Take Place During the Next Few Days

Minot, N. D., Oct. 28.—County Coroner Orson Doe of Kenmare held an inquest of the shooting affair at a negro dance in the west end of the city last Wednesday night, who died at a local hospital Thursday night from the wounds received in the fracas. The coroner's jury which heard the evidence and rendered the verdict was composed of A. P. Scofield, J. S. Smallwood and J. G. Belanger. A postmortem examination was conducted by Drs. Yeomans, Nestos and Overgard. Nothing was disclosed in that which was not already known except the location of the bullet which was found impacted against the hip bone on the opposite side of the body from which it entered. The perforations of the intestines were found to be the same as stated in the Optic-Reporter story of the matter yesterday, only one bullet was fired into the body. The only other evidence offered was that of Tom Harris, the keeper of the place where the dance was being held and where the shooting took place. He was in the room and witnessed the entire affair.
