Herr Lentz has also appeared at various Berlin events with the patronage of Hugo Kaum, Theodore Spiering and Robert Leugs. It is anticipated that the talent assisting Mr. Lentz will amply demonstrate that Bismarck is able to hold its own with any city in the state in music appreciation and interpretation, and the program of numbers will be well worth an especial effort to hear. It has been a particular desire of Mrs. Cushing for some time past, to bring this talent together, and to aid in demonstrating what can be done, in concert form, at home; and with the vital work that is being accomplished at the night school, it is a distinct incentive that the proceeds will be put to an excellent purpose.
