Minneapolis, Nov. 18.—The University of Minnesota, with powerful line drives, spectacular passes and puzzling crisscross plays, humbled the University of Wisconsin 54 to 0, in their annual football battle here today.

From the very outset, Minnesota made deep thrusts in the Wisconsin line, and by the third period, in which Minnesota scored 21 points, the wavering Badger defense had all but crumbled.

The ball was in Minnesota's possession for the greater part of the game.

Urbana, Ill., Nov. 18.—Western football prophecies were upset today when the University of Chicago defeated Illinois 20 to 7. The first touchdown was scored within a few minutes of play. Aga punted to Sternaman, who fumbled. Hackson, the Chicago captain, gathered in the ball and sprinted forty yards for a touchdown.

YALE TRIUMPHS OVER PRINCETON IN ANNUAL GAME

Princeton, N. J., Nov. 18.—Playing erratic but alert football, Yale triumphed over Princeton in the annual game here today, 10 to 0. The result of the contest, which attracted the largest gathering of spectators that ever thronged into Palmer stadium, was a bitter disappointment to Tiger adherents. Errors of play and the generalship by the Orange and Black team, virtually presented opportunities for Eli scoring, and the New Haven combination was quick to take advantage of the opening, with the result that the Blue won her third straight victory from the Orange and Black.

Brown Swamps Harvard, 20-0.
Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 18.—The Brown football team furnished a substantial setback today for a gridiron star, Fred Pollard, its negro halfback, whose brilliant attacks counted most of the 20 points by which the visitors defeated Harvard. Brown, undefeated through the season, prevented a Crimson score, and maintained its record of having held its goal line clear in every game. Although Pollard was the special object of Harvard's defense, which at times was so forceful to draw off warnings and in one instance of penalty for unnecessary roughness, he was effective in every department of play.

Dartmouth Plays Tie Game.
Hanover, N. H., Nov. 18.—Dartmouth closed its football season here today by playing a 7 to 7 tie with West Virginia. The game was played on a field two inches deep in mud.

Syracuse Snowed Under.
Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 18.—Colgate's powerful backfield was too much for the heavy Syracuse line and the Maroon took the 19th annual football game between the two teams by a score of 15 to 0 here this afternoon. The feature of the game was West's placement kick from the 50-yard line during the third period.

East Lansing, Mich., Nov. 18.—Notre Dame university football team defeated M. A. C. 14 to 0, here today by taking instant advantage of spectacular chances to score. The Aggies played desperately, but were outgeneraled and outlucked by the South Bend team.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 18.—Pennsylvania university football eleven, by taking advantage of opportunities and holding firm at critical moments, defeated Michigan 10 to 7 here today.

Nebraska Loses Hard Game.
Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 18.—The University of Nebraska suffered defeat at the hands of the University of Kansas here this afternoon by the score of 7 to 3. It was the first defeat Nebraska has suffered since 1911, and the first time Kansas has beaten Nebraska since 1909.
