60 APPLICANTS FOR NEW GRANT COUNTY BOARD

(Continued from Page One)

elgh, Brisbane and Leith; and, among the inland towns, Shields and Pretty Rock. All of these towns have had delegations in Bismarck almost every day since the recent election created Grant county, and every aspirant for county seatship is represented at the hearing in progress this afternoon.

To Name Board at Once.
At the opening of the hearing Governor Hanna announced that he would make his appointments immediately, providing he is served before the close of the hearing with an official notice of the creation of Grant county. This had not been done up to noon today, the action probably awaiting the official returns of the Morton county canvassing board.

Must Organize Immediately.
Upon the appointment of the three commissioners, they will be required to meet at once and organize the county board. This board will select a county seat, appoint a sheriff, treasurer, auditor, register of deeds, county judge, clerk of court, state's attorney and other officers; arrange for the transcription of records from Morton county, and make provision for the collection of taxes due Grant county. The last named item is an important one, as the newly created county naturally has not a penny in its treasury at the present time. It will have, however, a large sum in taxes due De-

cember 1, which were levied on Grant as a portion of Morton county, but which will be paid to the new county.

Will Board Agree.
It is generally taken for granted among the towns seeking the county seat that the commissioners named this afternoon will be selected partly because of their ability to agree upon some one town as the seat of government. There is no positive assurance that this will be the case, however. Should each of the three commissioners named have his own choice for county seat, a deadlock would ensue, and it is probable that the governor in his appointments will guard against such a contingency.

Legislative Representation.
There has been some uncertainty as to Grant county's representation in the Fifteenth assembly, and a question as to whether the new commissioners would be called upon to name a senator and member of the house. Governor Hanna advises that Grant county will be considered for legislative purposes a part of the district formerly comprised by Morton county, and that it will be represented in the next assembly by the legislators recently elected from Morton county. The commissioners will have no authority to name any state officers.
