

BURNSTAD MAN DIES IN LOCAL HOSPITAL

William H. Arntz, aged 75, of Burnstad, died this morning in the St. Alexis hospital, where he had been undergoing treatment since April 11 of this year. He was born in Germany, but had been a resident of the United States since he was 11 years old. Seven children survive. Funeral services will be conducted Monday morning, at 8:15, in St. Mary's cathedral. The body will be taken to Napoleon for interment. His daughter, Mrs. Max Stiel of Burnstad, has been in the city since the deceased entered the hospital and was with him when he died.
