

COACH "BABE" LAMB OF JAMESTOWN PICKS HIS ALL-STATE ELEVEN

D., Dec. 13.—Coach Lamb of the football team that represented Jamestown high school during the past season, has announced the personnel of an all-state eleven, selected from players who participated in high school games throughout the state last fall. The eleven was selected by a consensus of opinion of practically every high school football mentor. Coach Lamb sending his list to each coach and picking the team by this method.

Welterweight Division Overlooked for Years Gives Fistian Best Men of Period



After years of oblivion the welterweight division has come into its own! In all fighting circles there is perhaps no more interesting division today than that of the 142 pounders. Interest has been shifted from the lightweights, where a few tango dancers still romp on the stage, from the featherweights, where there is no one left to fight Johnny Kilbane, from the middleweights, where light-heavies and middleweights are quarreling over weights and from the heavies, who have all become jokes.

The welters offer the class of the ring today, with half a dozen great fighters so evenly matched that it is almost impossible to figure out a champion.

The title is claimed by Jack Britton, who won it in a decision fight from Willie Ritchie in Boston. Close on his heels is Ted Lewis, who won twice from Britton in 12 round bouts in the east, then lost a 20-round decision affair in New Orleans.

Johnny Griffiths, the Ohio flash, has one decision over Britton, and two no-decision fights, one of which was a draw and the other a shade in Britton's favor. Griffiths also lost by a shade to Lewis recently.

Willie Ritchie, former lightweight champion, has decided to stage a comeback this winter and must be reckoned on in this division.

Then there is Monte Cross, who recently knocked out Badout, the French welter champ, and Kid Graves, who claimed the title a couple of years ago, and Gilmore, the Chicago aspirant, and several others nearly as good.

Charley White, recognizing the popularity of the welters, thought of butting into the division until he was given a setback by Britton recently, after which he decided to stick with the lightweights.

There would be nothing more interesting in the boxing game than a championship tournament between Britton, Lewis, Griffiths, Cross and Ritchie.

If Tex Ricard leases Madison Square Garden this winter he is planning just such a tournament.
