Body of Late Myron Skeels To Lie in State Sunday From 10:30 to 3 O'Clock

DAUGHTER, MRS. JAMES FOLEY, TO ARRIVE SUNDAY

Funeral services over the remains of the late Myron Powell Skeels, 31 years a resident of North Dakota and for years a successful business man of the city, who passed away at St. Alexius hospital yesterday, will be held from the Masonic temple at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Announcement of the hour of the service was made late yesterday afternoon.

The Masonic body of Bismarck under Worshipful Master L. K. Thompson will have charge of the service and will be assisted by the Rev. C. H. Brown of Mandan, pastor of the Episcopal church of that city and long-time friend of the Skeels family. Interment will be made in Fairview cemetery.

The body of the late Myron Powell Skeels will lie in state at the temple from 10:30 o'clock Sunday morning until 3 o'clock, the hour of the service. The service as usual will be open to the public.

Word was received this morning that Mrs. James W. Foley, daughter, and her husband will arrive Sunday morning from Pasadena, Cal.

Death of the pioneer occurred yesterday morning, after being a patient in the hospital since September, 1915. Last Monday he celebrated his 80th birthday.
