IN THE HOTEL LOBBIES.
The lull which preceded and followed Christmas has been broken by the arrival of the legislators and newspapermen.

D. C. Coates of Fargo arrived in Bismarck early this morning on train No. 1, and was early today mingling with the boys and dispensing his usual good cheer.

Representative N. E. Whipple of Spiritwood, from the 23rd district, stated this morning that the storm played havoc with train service around Jamestown and throughout Stutsman county. Mr. Whipple is one of the pioneers of Stutsman county.

Senator Thomas Pendray of the 23rd district was one of the legislators to arrive in the city this morning. Undoubtedly, Senator Pendray will be one of the most influential personages in that chamber of the legislature at this session.

Ray McKaig of Mandan stated this morning that in his opinion the best way to preserve the wild game of the state is to enact a law providing for a closed season every other year. He stated that the matter is being strongly agitated in South Dakota and Minnesota.

J. N. Hagan, commissioner of agriculture and labor, with his chief deputy, Lloyd Rader of Dickinson, have arrived in the city. Mr. Rader is in the dairy business near Dickinson, was former principal of the schools at Taylor and served as county superintendent of schools of Stark county for two terms. There is a possibility that the Non-Partisan league caucus which will consider the proposition of calling a constitutional convention may not be held tomorrow but Saturday, according to the sentiment of prominent legislators today. The delay is due to the crippled train service on the branch lines, which has interfered with the arrival of many of the legislators.
