

CORPORATIONS TO BE REQUIRED TO OBSERVE LAW IN INCORPORATING

Procedure Customary in Secretary of State's Office Reversed by Langer

Procedure which has obtained in the secretary of state's office from time immemorial with regard to incorporation matters is reversed by an opinion handed down today from the attorney general's office. As a result

the incorporation of companies which recently have made application for charters will be delayed to some extent, and checks mailed the secretary of state's office will be returned to the senders.

Heretofore it has been the practice to mail a check covering the state tax and the charter and recording fee direct to the secretary of state, who deducts his fees and transfers the portion covering the state tax to the treasurer. The law provides that these two fees must be separated, the state tax mailed direct to the state treasurer, who furnishes the corporation with a duplicate receipt, and this receipt must be filed with the secretary of state in company with the articles of incorporation.

The state has lost nothing by the former practice, but a law which has been on the statute books for 20 years, and which now appears as Section 431 in the compiled laws of 1917, specifically provides for a division of the fees by the incorporator, and the attorney general requests that this statute be observed.

SOGGE CASE ONCE MORE REVERSED AND REMANDED FOR ANOTHER HEARING

The notorious Sogge infanticide case, reversed by the supreme court and then reargued, is a second time reversed and remanded for retrial in an opinion of the court written by Judge Christianson, and handed down yesterday afternoon.

This action, whose revolting details are generally known, originated in Benson county with the death of an infant alleged to have been born to Hetsy Sogge Jones. Her mother, Rhonhild Sogge, and her husband, Elmer Jones, were held as accomplices. The principal was found guilty of infanticide and the other two as accomplices in the original trial in the Towner district court, and the defendants, then appealed. After the supreme court had reversed the findings of the lower court and remanded the case, it granted a petition for reargument by the state, and yesterday's opinion is on the latter action.

FEDERAL OATH TAKEN BY ALL BUT ONE MAN IN DICKINSON GUARD

Major Dana Wright returned this forenoon from Dickinson, where last evening he administered the federal oath, calling for a six-years' term of service, three in active and three in reserve duty, to all but one member of Co. K. The one exception was a private whose present enlistment expires in a few days. Time already served in the national guard will be deducted from the period of active service under the new enlistment, and the only important change effected is the formation of a reserve force composed of guardsmen who may be called into active service at any time during the three years. Other companies of the North Dakota National Guard will receive the six-years' oath as soon as arrangement can be made for mustering them into the federal service.

Governor Frazier has recommended to the war department that Sergeant C. J. Kunz of Co. K be commissioned second lieutenant, and that Second Lieutenant Behonok be advanced to first lieutenant, succeeding J. F. Wiley, recently resigned.

NOTICE OF LEASING OF SCHOOL AND STATE LANDS

The school and state lands in Burleigh County, North Dakota, not already leased, will be offered for rent at a public leasing to be held at the court house in the city of Bismarck, in said county, on Thursday, the 12th day of April, 1917, commencing at 1:30 o'clock p. m. The terms of leasing will be as follows:

All lands will be offered for a term of five years, beginning with the season of 1917, and only for grazing and hay purposes, at the minimum annual rental of \$15.00 for each quarter section.

All lands will be struck off to the highest bidder, who will be required to pay at the time of leasing the rent for the season of 1917, also an additional fee of \$3.00 for issuing lease, which fee will be charged for each quarter section or fraction thereof included in such lease.

A list of the lands to be offered for lease will be on file with the treasurer of said county for public inspection for at least two weeks before the date of leasing. Coal rights are reserved to the state in all leases and the Board of University and School Lands reserves the right to reject any and all bids. ALL LEASES ARE SUBJECT TO CANCELLATION IN CASE OF WARE. The only way to secure the use of any school or state land is by leasing on above terms. No person has a right to cut hay, graze, or close-herd stock at any season of the year on state land without first securing a lease of the same

VICTORY FOR FARMERS IN REVISION OF GRAIN STANDARDS ANNOUNCED

St. Paul, April 3.—A big victory for farmers and grain interests in Minneapolis and other northwestern states is seen by O. P. Jacobson of the Minnesota railroad and warehouse commission in the revision of the federal grain standards as announced in dispatches from Washington.

The retention of the term "northwestern" on two classes of spring wheat is in itself of great benefit, he said, "and the increase in the percentage of moisture content will mean annual savings of many thousands of dollars to northwestern farmers."
