SHAW DEFEATS UPTON IN MINOT CITY ELECTION

Present Mayor of Commission Is Given Majority 83—Favors Liberal Administration

LITTLE INTEREST IN VALLEY CITY CAMPAIGN

Minot, N. D., April 4.—W. S. Shaw was yesterday re-elected president of the Minot city Commission over F. C. Upton by a majority of 83 votes in one of the most heated campaigns in the history of the city. Shaw favors a liberal administration. Elected on the Shaw ticket were A. P. Scofield and E. C. Malin. Hundreds of pounds of campaign literature was distributed at the eleventh hour by both political factions.

Lakota, N. D., April 4.—(Special)—There was an exceptionally warm race for mayor here yesterday. J. W. Murphy defeated Dr. E. Lohrbauer for mayor by seven votes. For city treasurer, J. D. Gronna and George Holicky are tied. The new aldermen elected are C. J. Bird, M. Holicky, J. J. Lynch, A. E. Goldammer, W. G. Hazy, Fred Ferris. Senator Gronna remained in Lakota over Saturday to help his son in the campaign. He also campaigned for Dr. Lohrbauer.

Business Houses and Residences Go Back to Times of Candles and Lamps

Steele, N. D., April 4.—Steele is in darkness these nights, not because of fear from an attack by a foreign fleet of airships, but because the franchise of the Goodwin Light and Power company has been revoked on the ground that the company does not serve the municipality.

COUNCIL TAKES NO ACTION

The city council met in special session this morning to discuss the situation. Little was done. Several days ago, the company submitted the proposition of the city taking over the plant and making it a municipal plant. The consensus of opinion seems favorable to this project, but on the other hand a few opponents claim that the company by refusing to serve the city last night actually seeks to force the plant on the city.

Carl Kekusch of Hillsboro Badly Trampled on and Injured by Vicious Horse

(Special to The Tribune.) Hillsboro, N. D., April 4.—Carl Kekusch, a farm laborer, was nearly killed yesterday by a kick from a vicious stallion. The animal took fright at a dog and struck Kekusch, squarely on the forehead, completely crushing his skull. The man fell at the feet of the stallion and was badly trampled upon, sustaining serious wounds on his hip and knee. Kekusch was hurried to the Hillsboro hospital. Physicians say his condition is precarious.
