D., April 6.—Attorney Theodore Kalder, the well-known lawyer of this city, who achieved state-wide prominence in the recent fight he made against house bill No. 44, the Nonpartisan League magna charta, was yesterday elected president of the city commission at the annual spring election.

STRANGER ENDS LIFE AT MINOT DRINKS POISON

Believed to Be John L. Jones of Hartford, Mich.—Empty Vial Found Near Body

(Tribune Special Service.) Minot, N. D., April 6.—A man identified as John L. Jones was found dead on the road running past the Harry A. Meyers farm, three miles south of the city, by George Gasmann, an employee of Meyers. Dr. Pence and Chief of Police Dougherty were notified and went to the scene at once, and it was found that death resulted from cyanide potassium poisoning, an empty vial of which was found near the body, while a full one was among the effects taken from the body.

BILL ASKS FOR BIBLE READING IN THE SCHOOLS

Education Committee of Minnesota House Recommends Its Passage

St. Paul, Minn., April 6.—The education committee of the lower house of the Minnesota legislature last night recommended the passage of a bill providing for the reading of the Bible in the public schools of the state. The bill provides that a portion of the Bible may be read daily without consent for the purpose of moral instruction. Such Bible reading shall be made from selections set forth by the United Bible selection committee or designated by the state superintendent of education.
