LEAGUE MEN DEFENDANTS IN \$50,000 SUIT

Senator Englund of Kenmare, Alleges Defamation of Character—Papers in Fargo

SOUTH HEART GRAIN HOUSE IS DESTROYED

About 5,000 Bushels Grain Ruined From Heat and Water—Capacity Was 40,000

(Special to Tribune.) Dickinson, N. D., April 10.—The grain elevator owned by the N. J. Steffan Grain company was burned to the ground at South Heart last week. The elevator had a capacity of 40,000 bushels. About 5,000 bushels of grain was destroyed. A number of train men left here for South Heart in response to the call. The company's elevator at Belfield burned to the ground a short time ago, with a large quantity of stored grain.

HAND SHATTERED TO BITS IN ACCIDENT

(Special to Tribune) Jamestown, N. D., April 10.—Joseph Thiring, Northern Pacific engineer, suffered the loss of his right hand Sunday while engaged in his duties at the Northern Pacific round-house. Thiring was down in under the engine and in some manner it started suddenly, the steam evidently not having been cut off. His hand was shattered to fragments. He was rushed to the Parkview hospital and the member amputated.

Block System Will Be Installed on Yellowstone Division of Northern Pacific

Several thousand dollars worth of material is being stored at points along the river preparatory to putting the crews to work. The cost of installation of this system is estimated at half a million dollars.
