

GENERAL CROWDER INSTRUCTS LOCAL BOARDS TO PROCEED IN EXAMINING OF FIRST DRAFT

Local boards today received wired instructions from General Fraser to proceed with the physical examination of registrants in Class 1, in the order of their liability for service, until a sufficient number have been found qualified to fill deferred percentages of the current quotas, but not to proceed beyond that number, plus a reasonable surplus to care for cases that may be rejected on appeal.

"These examinations," says General Fraser's instructions, which came today in a message from Provost Marshal General Crowder, "may be conducted under the old regulations until new regulations arrive. If the examination of a sufficient number is completed before the arrival of the new regulations, then the examination of other men in Class 1 shall be delayed pending the arrival of the new regulations. It is of the utmost importance that the examination of a sufficient number to fill deferred percentages of the current quota be completed as rapidly as possible."

This order is considered confirmation of The Tribune's press reports from Washington yesterday that North Dakota's deferred quota of 4 per cent, or about 2,000 men, would be called February 22. All physical examinations were suspended by the order, but today's instructions, which came today in a message from Provost Marshal General Crowder, "may be conducted under the old regulations until new regulations arrive. MODEL CONSTITUTION FOR NORTH DAKOTA OFFERED BY PERIODICAL WOULD CUT DOWN ASSEMBLY TOTAL

The Nonpartisan league, through its propaganda for House Bill 44, seems to have so firmly established a belief that North Dakota's present constitution is worn out, after 29 years' use that we find "Equity," a national periodical dealing with government reform, proposing a "Model Constitution for North Dakota," in its current issue. This constitution, Equity announces, is based on a draft drawn for New York by Albert H. Jackson, of Buffalo, N. Y., and has been prepared by C. G. Hoag and Albert B. Maris, secretaries of the American proportional representation league. The purpose of the proposed constitution is announced to be "to provide for a government that will be sensitively responsive to the will of the people—a government that will not be hampered by a multitude of restrictions, or lost to public view in a jungle of entangled responsibilities known as 'checks and balances.'"

The constitution vests legislative power in a legislative assembly and all other governmental power shall be vested in the legislative assembly and such other officers and departments as may be designated by law; but the voters reserve to themselves the power to propose and amend amendments to this constitution, and to enact or reject them at the polls, independently of the legislative assembly, and also reserve the power at their own option to approve or reject at the polls any legislative act or resolution, or any part thereof, enacted by the legislative assembly. All laws enacted by the legislative assembly must receive the affirmative votes of a majority of all the members of the legislative assembly.

"The legislative assembly shall consist of 49 members, elected for the term of four years," which provision would restrict the legislature to an equivalent of the present membership of the senate.

The proposed constitution would divide the state into seven assembly districts, each of which would elect seven members, as follows:

First—Cavalier, Pembina, Walsh, Grand Forks and Nelson; seven members.

Second—Traill, Steele, Griggs, Burleigh and Cass; seven members.

Third—Richland, Ramsey, LaMoure, Logan, Emmons, McIntosh, Dickey and Sargent; seven members.

Fourth—Stutsman, Kidder, Burleigh, McLean, Sheridan, Wells, Eddy and Foster; seven members.

Fifth—McHenry, Pierce, Benson, Ramsey, Towner, Rolette and Bottineau; seven members.

Sixth—Divide, Renville, Burke, Williams, McKeen, Mountrail and Ward; seven members.

Seventh—Dakota, Golden Valley,

THOUSAND MAY SUFFER HEAVY PENALTIES THROUGH FAILURE TO MAKE INCOME TAX RETURN

Every unmarried person whose net income for the year 1917 was \$1,000 or more and every married person living with wife or husband whose net income for that period was \$2,000 or more must have an income tax report of that income in the hands of the collector of internal revenue or one of his deputies before the close of business on March 1, 1918, or suffer the penalties provided by law.

Every employer must send to the collector a list of the names and addresses of all employees to whom he paid \$500 or more during the year 1917.

Everything possible has been and is being done by the government to advertise this law and help those who must pay the tax.

Income tax blanks are being mailed out from this office to individuals, banks and field deputy collectors as soon as I receive them. They are being printed and sent to me as rapidly as possible by the commissioner of internal revenue.

A careful study of the reports from my field deputies and from the banks throughout this district show that with the month of January gone and only the balance of February left in which to make a report, the number of people in North and South Dakota who have made inquiries in regard to this law is surprisingly small.

"I know conditions in these two states and I feel sure that unless the banks, newspapers, farmers and employers of labor take hold of this matter and urge all those that they have reason to believe should make


