BURLEIGH COUNTY RED CROSS CHAPTER MAKES BIG SHIPMENT

The Burleigh County Chapter Red Cross shipped yesterday:
Knitted articles—9 dozen sweaters, 70 pairs wristlets, 155 pairs socks, one half dozen mufflers, and 1 knitted quilt which was turned in by the Bismarck Junior high school.
Of the above articles the following branches contributed:
Regan: 21 sweaters, 42 pairs wristlets, 7 mufflers, 1 trench cap and 6 helmets.
McKenzie: 24 pairs socks and 10 sweaters.
Northeast Burleigh: 18 pairs socks, 13 sweaters, 4 pairs wristlets.
Baldwin: 11 sweaters, 7 pairs wristlets and 2 pairs socks.
The remainder of the goods in the above shipment was made by the Bismarck ladies.
Hospital garments: 60 hospital shirts, 72 bath robes, 144 suits of pajamas, 36 pairs of bed socks, 18 caps, 49 pillows, 36 sponges, 36 napkins and 49 towels.
