

RESERVE BANK TO RESUME IN NORTH DAKOTA

Suit to Test Seed Bonding Law
Withdrawn for New Surety
Bond Plan

ALL DIFFICULTY REMOVED

St. Paul, Minn., April 10.—President E. G. Quamme of the St. Paul federal land bank announced today that the difficulties encountered as to the priority of liens by virtue of the recently enacted seed grain and feed law in North Dakota have been overcome and that the bank will resume operations in North Dakota.

The bank has withdrawn the suit to test the constitutionality of the seed bonding law in that state since the working out of a plan, with the assistance of the federal farm loan board, which provides for the filing of a surety bond by the farmer to protect the land loan bank.

FIND KORNEMANN GUILTY ON FOUR COUNTS, UNLOYAL

South Dakota German Editor and
Alliance President Violated
Espionage

BOASTED HE WAS TRAITOR

Sioux Falls, S. D., April 10.—Conrad Kornemann, president of the South Dakota branch of the German-American alliance and editor of a German language newspaper here, was convicted by a jury on four counts of an indictment charging violation of the espionage act, in the United States district court here tonight.

Letters which Kornemann had written to business associates and friends constituted the evidence presented against him at the trial. The letters were seized several months ago, in raids on a German newspaper in Aberdeen, S. D., and on Kornemann's newspaper office and home here.

In a letter written to E. W. Saller, editor of the Aberdeen paper, who was taken into custody at the time, on a charge of failing to file correct translations of articles appearing in his papers, Kornemann declared:

"I have never given any declaration of loyalty and will never do it, nor subscribe to any liberty loan (the name is to me already an insult because hypocritical and misleading)."

It was developed at the trial that later Kornemann purchased \$5,000 worth of liberty bonds.

M. N. G. OFFICER DISCHARGED FOR DISLOYAL TALKS

Brigadier General Frederick E.
Resche, Born in Germany,
Not Efficient.

Washington, D. C., April 10.—Discharge from the federal service of Brigadier General Frederick E. Resche of Minnesota, a national guard officer, born in Germany and charged with unpatriotic expressions and sentiments, was announced today by the war department.

The discharge was ordered by President Wilson after an investigation of the charges against General Resche, who had been serving with the 34th National guard division, composed of troops from Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska and North Dakota, now training at Camp Cody, New Mexico.

At the war department it was stated that no overt act of disloyal nature had been charged against General Resche, and that this feature had not been touched upon in the investigation of his case. Reports made by inspectors upon the condition of the brigade which he commanded was said to have been the principal basis for the discharge.

"The primary desire of the war department, it was said, was to get out of the service an officer of high rank who was shown by the reports of inspectors to be lacking in zeal and enterprise in preparing his command for conflict with the German army. For that reason, he was promptly discharged, and the question of his loyalty left to be passed upon by the civil branch of the government. The discharge makes a civilian of General Resche. Had he been a regular army officer the war department's course would have been different."

Duluth, Minn., April 10.—Before the present war Brigadier General F. E. Resche was humane officer of Duluth, and was connected with the Duluth police department. He was born in Germany and received his military training in the Prussian army. Some years ago he was captain of police here. He was active in national guard circles in the state and rose rapidly from the ranks.

FIRE INSURANCE MEN WANT RATES IN N. D. RAISED

S. A. Olsness Present at Conference Being Held in Minneapolis

St. Paul, Minn., April 10.—Claiming to be hit by increased expenses and taxes because of the war and proposing to add a surcharge of 10 percent on fire insurance premiums in Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota, fire insurance companies representatives to a joint meeting of the commissioners of those states today
