

STATE FARMERS MAY KEEP SEED WHEAT—RULING

Fargo, N. D., May 4.—North Dakota farmers may retain 25 percent of the wheat necessary for seeding the 1919 crop, according to an announcement by Dr. E. F. Ladd, state food administrator. This wheat may be kept until success of the 1918 crop is assured. The time for disposal of all surplus wheat has been extended from May 15 to June 1, says the announcement.
