


NEW YORK LOAN TOTAL \$1,002,900,200, OVER TOP MORE THAN 103 MILLION

New York, N. Y., May 7.—Tabulation of subscriptions to the third liberty loan, filed at the last minute with the New York reserve bank, brought the district's total tonight to \$1,002,900,200, according to the last official announcement which will be made here until Thursday, when all the banks will have sent in their returns.

WARREN CANDIDATE FOR RE-ELECTION TO SENATE

Cheyenne, Wyo., May 7.—Senator Frances E. Warren, who a year ago announced his intention to retire from the United States senate when his present term expired, will be a candidate for re-election this fall, he announced today in a telegram received here by Patrick Sullivan, chairman of the republican state central committee.

75 MILLION CREDIT TO GREAT BRITAIN

Washington, May 7.—An additional credit of \$75,000,000 was extended to Great Britain by the treasury today, bringing the total of American loans to that nation to \$2,795,000,000 and the total of credits to all co-belligerents to \$5,363,850,000.

WYOMING TORPEDO PLANT DESTROYED, TWO KILLED, BY NITRO EXPLOSIONS

Billings, Mont., May 7.—Exploding nitro-glycerine today demolished Swanson Torpedo Company's plant, four miles from Grey Bull, Wyoming, and caused the death of W. W. Walter, superintendent, and Chas. Gerrard, worker.

CARSON WARNS HOME RULE IS UNSAFE POLICY

London, May 7.—Sir Edward Carson the Ulster Unionist leader in another forcible letter to the press warns the government of the danger of its home rule policy. He expressed doubt as to whether the government really intends to apply conscription to Ireland and urged the Unionist party to compel reconsideration of the government's policy.

ASK FULL STATEMENT

London, May 7.—The Unionist members of parliament are signing a requisition asking Mr. Bonar Law to summon a party meeting for Thursday in order that a full statement may be made concerning the home rule bill.

ARTILLERY ACTIVE NORTH OF THE LYS

London, May 7.—"Our own and the enemy's artillery have been very active north of the Lys and have shown some activity on other parts of the battlefronts," says Field Marshal Haig's report from British headquarters in France tonight.

NEW YORK MASONS TO RAISE MILLION FOR MERCY FUND

New York, N. Y., May 7.—A war relief fund of at least \$1,000,000 with no maximum limit, will be raised by the grand lodge of Masons of New York state, it was announced tonight. The money will be used to care for needy families of Masons in the National service as well as to relieve suffering among members of the order who now are on the battlefield or in prison camps. A commission will be sent to France to administer the expenditure of the fund abroad.

WOMEN OFFICE WORKERS WAGE MINIMUM \$10 WEEK

San Francisco, May 7.—Ten dollars weekly is the minimum wage for women in professional and general offices, fixed today by the state industrial commission, effective July 2.

BUCK, SLAYER OF MINOT OFFICERS, GETS LIFE TERM

Minot, N. D., May 7.—Arthur Buck, who pleaded guilty to killing patrolman Pat Deveney and special officer Cowin here on April 26, was sentenced to life imprisonment today by Judge Leighton. Buck, with three other men, was engaged in stealing an automobile when the police found them. The shooting followed.

NEW CANDIDATES FILE PETITIONS

St. Paul, Minn., May 7.—Two more candidates for the gubernatorial office filed their petitions today—Judge W. L. Comstock, of Mankato, on the democratic ticket; and L. P. Berot, of Columbia Heights, socialist, both filings came as surprises.

COWBOY MAYOR DEFEATED

Omaha, Neb., May 7.—One hundred precincts out of 154 in city election indicates Mayor Jim Dahlen, famous cowboy Mayor of Omaha for 7 years, has been defeated for re-election.

CONSTANTINE VERY ILL; DEATH NEEAR

Paris, May 7.—Former King Constantine of Greece is seriously ill at Zurich, Switzerland, according to a dispatch to the Temps from Zurich.

Those at the bedside of the former monarch, according to the correspondent, regard a fatal termination of his illness as not improbable.

TWO STUDENT FLYERS DEAD

Miami, Fla., May 7.—Lieutenant Melvin E. Sullivan and Sergeant Calvin E. Cronk, of the marine corps were killed at the Curtiss marine flying school near here late today when their airplane from which they were practicing gunnery, fell about 700 ft.

MINN. LIEUTENANT KILLED IN ACTION

Minneapolis, Minn., May 7.—Lieutenant Arthur E. Gaylord, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tison Gaylord, Minneapolis, has been killed in action in France, his parents were notified by the war department tonight.
