

FOCH CONTINUES TO HAMMER HUN LINES OVER ENTIRE WEST FRONT

(Continued From Page One) TWO MILES FROM DOUAI. (By the Associated Press.)

London, Oct. 12.—German troops in the region of Douai are retiring behind the Sensee canal. British forces have reached a line two miles west of Douai.

The withdrawal of the Germans across the Sensee canal has been more or less completed. It is believed Marshal Haig's men will be across the canal and on the outskirts of Douai tomorrow morning. The Germans are continuing their retirement from the famous Chemins des Dames and it is expected the whole of the famous highway will be evacuated soon.

ATTEMPT TO SLOW UP ADVANCE.

(By Associated Press.)

With the British in France, (Thursday) Oct. 11.—The enemy today began an attempt to slow up the Anglo-American advance on the main battlefield. All the bridges across the river Selle, south from La Cateau, were blown up and the Germans seem to have been digging in furiously on the line some 2,000 to 4,000 yards east of the river, which has been crossed at several places by the British and Americans. Apparently the Germans intend to make a stand here. In this locality all operations have been devoted to gain the river's crossing. There has been sharp machine gun fighting and the Germans from the high ground of La Cateau have poured a heavy fire on the west bank of the river.

As soon as the Americans and the cavalry entered St. Souplet south of La Cateau they came under a heavy fire from the German gun concentration. It is reported that the enemy gunners fired their weapons here over open sights.

South of here the British and French have driven deeply into enemy territory and the French now control a long strip of the west bank of the Oise canal. British advance patrols also have reached the canal at Long Champs, but they had made too rapid progress and consequently returned.

RESISTANCE IS BITTER.

With the American Forces Northwest of Verdun, (Noon) Oct. 12.—General Pershing's forces continued their attacks against the German positions on this front today. German opposition proved even more bitter if possible than it was yesterday.

The fighting this morning was especially violent on the center and left center. St. Juvin and Cunel, both of which towns now are in No Man's Land, are aflame.

The American troops encountered a violent machine gun fire everywhere along the front. From prisoners taken there is every indication that the enemy is throwing everything into the battle in a confused way. The prisoners frequently are unable to tell to what division they belong. In other cases they reveal that regiments and companies have been dissolved and again formed into new units.



Discovery Day Expected to Boost Liberty Loan Sale

Washington, Oct. 12.—Set aside as Liberty day in a proclamation issued

by President Wilson, today was expected to be marked by a great outpouring of citizens to the fourth Liberty loan. By virtue of also being Discovery Day it was observed as a holiday in many states, while in others it was celebrated as Liberty Loan day. On the eve of Liberty day the sub-

scription to the fourth loan total was \$2,269,876,200, which is less in comparison with the amount to be raised than at a similar period in any previous campaign. With a big jump in total subscriptions expected from today's operations, treasury officials were optimistic. However, they regarded it as the critical stage in the campaign.

"Double your subscription" was the motto for the day's celebration in many communities.

FIRST PAYMENT ON BONDS MUST BE MADE SOON. North Dakota banks are urging patrons who have not made the first payment on their Liberty bond purchases of the fourth issue to pay up not later than Saturday, October 19, as, unless the initial payment has been made before that date, bonds cannot be ordered. Probably 80 per cent of the subscribers to the fourth loan paid their initial ten per cent when they made application. The laggards among the remaining twenty per cent are urged to speed up.

DOYLE'S TOUR IN KIDDER WAS BIG SUCCESS. People's Candidate for Governor Speaks to More Than 2,000 People. Steele, N. D., Oct. 12.—Concluding a day's tour of Ashley and Kidder county, S. J. Doyle addressed a large crowd in Steele at an open air meeting, and he was most enthusiastically received. Mr. Doyle spoke to a full house at Wishek, over 300 people, most of them farmers, being present; at Ashley he addressed 200; at Napoleon he addressed 350, and at Kintyre and here he was greeted by very good crowds. The tour that Mr. Doyle is making is becoming increasingly successful, and a greater number are turning out each day. It is estimated now that he is speaking to from 1,000 to 2,000 people every day.

Mr. Doyle's policy of discussing the campaign issue is winning friends for him wherever he goes. He is staying away from personalities, and has given his audiences some concrete facts as to what the Socialist program means for North Dakota, particularly for those who own land. Desperate efforts still are being made by the Socialists who direct the affairs of the National Nonpartisan league to keep their members from attending the Doyle meetings, but the effort apparently has fallen flat.
