92 PRINCIPALS - 13 ALTERNATES FOR FT. SCOTT

Men Selected for Entrainment From Bismarck Week From Next Friday.

TO GO ON SPECIAL TRAIN

Burleigh County Will be Joined West of River by Slope Contingents.

The names of 92 principals and 13 alternates have been drawn by the Burleigh county draft board to supply this county's contingent of 92 to enter at 1:35 p. m., Friday, October 25, at Bismarck on a special train which will run through as a special to Fort Winfield Scott, near San Francisco, going via Butte, the Oregon Short Line to Ogden, Utah, and thence northern Pacific to destination.

The contingent will be the largest which Burleigh county has entrained since its entrance in the war. Among those called are some of Bismarck's most prominent young business men. Glover H. Dollar and Christian Lucas are included among the 92 principals, and A. R. Askason, deputy state insurance commissioner, is among the alternates.

FEW NEW CASES BUT EPIDEMIC IS VIRULENT

Late Attacks of Spanish Influenza Seem More Severe Than the First!

AGGIE BOYS IN DISTRESS

While fewer new cases of Spanish influenza were reported in Bismarck today, and in spite of the fact that no new deaths have occurred, the epidemic appears to be increasing in virulence, and late attacks have been much more severe than those which occurred in the early stages of the scourge. Health Officer F. B. Strauss today advised that the order requiring waitresses and others who are engaged in handling food to wear masks will be strictly enforced. There is one dining room, stated the health commissioner, whose waitresses have declined to wear the masks, and authorities will take steps to see that they comply or are prevented from serving food.

ATTACK AT UNDERWOOD.

Underwood, N. D., Oct. 15.—Dr. W. T. Cain today advised that several cases of Spanish influenza had developed in Underwood. The situation is not yet serious, but every possible precaution is being taken.

BAD AT STATE AGGIE.

Fargo, N. D., Oct. 15.—Few new cases of flu were reported today, but there were three deaths in Fargo and one in Moorhead. Trinity Lutheran church in Moorhead has been taken over by the Red Cross and converted into a hospital.
