

MEN OVER 37 WILL NOT BE CLASSIFIED

Questionnaires Which Already Have Gone Out May Be Returned to Board

Adjutant General Fraser, today transmitted to local draft boards the following instructions, issued by the secretary of war to the provost marshal general: "You will at once instruct state headquarters and local and district boards immediately to discontinue all work connected with the classification of men who on September 12, 1918, had attained their 37th birthday. You will further instruct said boards to continue to completion as expeditiously as possible the classification of all registrants who on September 12, 1918, had attained their 19th birthday and had not attained their 37th birthday. You will finally at the earliest possible moment, direct all local and district boards to issue questionnaires to all registrants who on September 12, 1918, had not attained their 18th birthday and had not attained their 19th birthday, and proceed with and complete as early as possible the classification of such registrants."

English, of national renown as a social hygiene lecturer and author, will give four lectures at the Bismarck high and junior high schools tomorrow and Friday under the auspices of the board of education. At 10:30 tomorrow morning in the high school assembly room she will speak to the boys of 12 and over on "Playing the Game." At 2:15 tomorrow afternoon at the high school assembly Mrs. English will address all girls over 12-14 and the women of the city on "The Girl and Her Problems."

Friday forenoon at 11 Mrs. English will address the boys and men at the junior high school assembly, and at 3 Friday afternoon she will speak to the girls and the women of the city at the same place.

Mrs. English is accompanied by her daughter, Miss Dorothy English, who varies the program with flute and whistling numbers. Capt. Richard H. Holmboe says of Mrs. English: "No discussion goes deeper into the foundation of good citizenship, good government, good sound womanhood and manhood than this long neglected discussion of the truths and science of right living. To be able to present this subject factually, yet strongly, is an art few possess. Mrs. English is happily endowed with a womanly earnestness which enables her to do this without offense to the most critical."

ALL TROOPS EN ROUTE TO CAMP RETURNED HOME

General Fraser advises that the United States railroad administration has been directed to stop en route all inducted men already entrained and who have not been delivered to an army mobilization camp under the recent calls, returning such men immediately to the place of their entrainment. President Wilson directs that all such registrants shall be discharged from the army immediately upon their return to the original point of entrainment.

Local boards are required to immediately so notify each registrant by letter, wire or orally. Registrants whose induction orders are cancelled, or who are discharged by this order shall revert to the status existing at the time of the issuing of the original induction order, including a resumption of their order and serial number. The order will not operate to relieve from the consequences of his acts any registrant affected by these instructions who has heretofore become a delinquent or a deserter.

AMERICAN PROTECTIVE LEAGUE STILL NEEDED

Inducted Men Will Be Discharged and Returned to Old Draft Status

"The need for the American Protective League is as great now as it has been in the past, and I am entirely satisfied that the need for this organization will continue for some time to come, entirely without regard to the progress of the peace negotiations," says A. B. Bielski, chief of the department of justice bureau of investigations, in a letter to local directors of the league correcting an impression which he says he has found prevalent to the effect that the work of the league is at an end.
