## FIRST CLASS WATER WAGON SERVICE NOT EASY THING TO GET

In spite of the 30 years' technical drouth in North Dakota, Bismarck is finding it difficult to procure first class water wagon service. The city commission last evening rejected all bids for street sprinkling and instructed the city auditor to re-advertise. In the meantime, the streets will go unsprinkled. It is barely possible that the city commission may decide to take this public service out of public hands and to invest a few hundred dollars in a couple of sprinkling wagons.  
Resolutions were adopted for the construction of a storm sewer on Ninth street from Avenue E to Avenue C, and Marcus A. Edburg was ordered by resolution to remove a portion of one of his houses which is alleged to project into the city street.  
The most important business of the evening was the first reading of an ordinance extending the street rail franchise of the state of North Dakota to permit the extension of its rails east on Main to Tenth and thence north to the capital. The ordinance was referred to a committee consisting of Commissioner J. P. French, City Attorney H. P. O'Hare and City Engineer T. R. Atkinson.  
The city attorney reported his opinion as to the legality of the practice instituted by the city commission some time ago of demanding that resignations be filed by city appointees upon accepting appointment. The commission encountered a tarrar in the person of Dr. P. R. Smyth, city controller of the poor, who accepted his appointment but returned his resignation unsigned, declaring the city commission's request for an advance resignation un-American and smacking of autocracy.
