

ROMANCE POSSESSES GREATER CHARM FOR FIRST LADY IN LAND THAN ANY ORDINARY POLITICAL CONSIDERATION

Mrs. Woodrow Wilson Carries in Her Purse Withered Rose Which Bloomed Near No-Man's Land—Dresses Quietly and in Good Taste—Just Traveling Round With Woodrow to Take Care of the Man—Sends Her Flowers to Local Hospitals.

Romance, more than politics, interests the first lady of the land. In the silver mesh purse carried by Mrs. Woodrow Wilson when she came to Bismarck yesterday, was a tiny faded rose, grown on a sunny hillside in France which overlooked a battle field where many American boys gave up their lives for democracy.

The rose was thrown at President Wilson by a little French mother, as she signed the peace treaty at Versailles. "It means a great deal, that little rose," Mrs. Wilson says. "It showed what the French mothers thought of American mothers for sending their boys into the great war. I shall always carry it."

WORE ROSE IN COAT President Wilson wore the rose in his lapel after it was thrown at him at Versailles, and later, Mrs. Wilson rescued it. "See, the fragrance still clings to it," she said as she showed it to friends here.

The mistress of the White House is an unassuming person with a very infectious smile, a personality which invites friendship, a decided prejudice against talking about herself—and an ever present worry about whether her husband is happy and comfortable. "I go along with him to take care of him, you know," she said. "After all, that is a woman's first duty to her family."

And right here, Mrs. Wilson gave away a secret. President Wilson does not know how many girls have ratified the suffrage bill. Mrs. Wilson does. She told him yesterday that Minnesota was the 14th to give women the vote. "You see, our wives know more than we do about world affairs, even now," the president laughed.

Everybody was interested this morning in the president's wife, what she wore, how she wore it, what she said and how she said it.

NO JEWELRY DISPLAY "White gloves are not practical for shaking hands as often as I must," she said. Her pumps were dull leather. Mrs. Wilson does not believe in a display of jewelry. Her only ornaments were a platinum wrist watch and an old-fashioned locket, which she is sentimental enough to wear where her grandmother wore it, pinned on her waist. She wore no flowers, and her plan is to send the flowers which she received in Bismarck to hospitals.

My visit in Europe—it was wonderful," she said. "I found the hospitality and the earnestness and the interest of the women of the allied countries a beautiful inspiration. I love the old-fashioned, traditional, inherent patriotism of the women of France and Belgium. In Belgium, while the men salute the flag, the women court to it. They feel it a privilege to make a physical demonstration of their love for their flag."

ARDOR IN ENGLAND "And whoever thinks the English an undemonstrative race is wrong. I was surprised at the ardor and the enthusiasm with which we were met everywhere in England. The war has brought a display of emotion to people unaccustomed to any demonstration. It has made us one by a common sorrow and a common goal."
