It was in 1881 that women first gained the right to vote. It was the Isle of Man that enfranchised its women in that year.

Since then, New Zealand, Australia, Finland, Norway, Iceland, Denmark, Russia, Canada, Austria, Czechoslovakia, England, Germany, Hungary, Ireland, Poland, Scotland, Wales, Holland, Sweden and Italy have granted women suffrage.

FEDERAL AID TO SOLDIERS

THE KAISER'S DISTRESS CALL (Published in Leipziger Neueste Nachrichten, Leipzig, Germany, Thursday, Sept. 19, 1914.)

With shrill voice the kaiser calls upon the world, and woe to those who doubt his word: That the French and British, bound to each other in infamy, charge their guns with explosive bullets, with darts, which tear the body barbarously, which one with scruples would employ only against the fiercest beasts.

But who is M. Papst? Is he not one of many? For also Czar Nicholas howls his woe to the skies over the criminal German militia (landwehr). As the Russians in East Prussia like an intractable beast fall upon the defenseless, only to cowardly sink away when a German bayonet flashes in the sun; as the "chivalrous" French insult all laws of humanity; as the word has been given out at London that all German nature must be annihilated, exterminated, by all means be destroyed; as every law of humanity is methodically violated, that is to be covered with the mantle of hypocrisy.

But the German patience has a limit. It is unbearable that the great and strong movement which drove our people with unanimous purpose into a war of necessity, should be misrepresented by liars as a robber gang; our heroes represented as Huns; and when we until now forbearingly, fought humanely—now, it can be otherwise; welcome then the long wished for word from general headquarters: "The precedent of France and England will finally compel Germany to retaliate her opponents' barbaric conduct of war with like means." With the member by which one sins shall be punished: Let us take the darts which France and England furnished us and pepper them into the ranks of the enemy! Not upon us, but upon them comes the guilt, if really this holy German war becomes a barbaric war, if also in our folk the wild instincts of primeval time shall awake.

Kaiser Wilhelm has directed his appeal to the President of the United States, the first citizen of a great republic, who alone, still spared from the gray of war, may impartially weigh the right. Will the shrill clamor sway Mr. Wilson? Will he find the strength to put in his veto and underline it with the sword? Also upon his head, if he keep silent, comes a part of the guilt, and no declamation will then free him from the "Guilty" of the world's judgment. And if he doubts, if he believes the others—now, a Hohenzollern does not lie, and our kaiser's honor is the honor of the whole people. The kaiser has established it, his word shines through perpetually enduring times (sein Wort leuchtet durch ewig waehrende Zeiten)—his word is true, the seal of God! (sein Wort ist Wahrhaft, das Siegel Gottes!)

WHERE DENISHAWN GIRLS ARE TRAINED





CAPITOL FLAG ETIQUETTE In defense of criticism recently made in regard to showing proper respect for the flag, at the State Capitol:

I wish to explain so that all our citizens will understand what seemingly appeared to be carelessness on the part of the person in charge at the Capitol building.

Ever since I have been in charge of the Capitol building, I have had it strictly understood that our flag is taken down by the night man in the evening and raised by him before he leaves in the morning.

This flag is on a very large wooden pole set on the Capitol roof. When the wind blows from the northwest and changes during the day, it winds the flag around the pole, and there is no man living who can take it down without tearing it all to pieces; so it happens, but only occasionally, that the flag must be left up all night. Everybody knows that the wind is very much stronger on Capitol hill than it is down town. Also on very windy days, the flag is not raised as it would be torn to shreds in no time. It happened recently that the flag was left up all night, but this is unavoidable unless someone finds a way to remedy this trouble, or we have some different device up there for lowering and raising the flag.

It has happened during sleety winter weather that the flag was frozen on the pole and was up for two or three nights until the weather moderated.

I have been at the Capitol many years and have always tried to show the proper respect for our flag, and tried to keep up all our patriotic customs.
