

INQUEST OVER VARSITY HEAD KEPT SECRET

No One But Members of Board of Administration Are Admitted to Quiz

SEEKING NEW GROUNDS

Believed That Opponents of the President Feel Case Must Be Stronger

Grand Forks, Feb. 23.—Deans and heads of departments at the state university were Saturday being questioned by the majority members of the state board of administration Saturday in the effort to find some justification for the effort to remove Thomas F. Kane from the presidency of that institution.

President Kane was given no opportunity to hear or refute the testimony which is thus presented only the three members of the board, George A. Totten, Sr., Robert Muir and J. N. Hazan, and a stenographer, being present.

What further action, if any, is contemplated by the board members at this time could not be learned.

The president was in conference with members of the board late Friday afternoon. At that time it is understood that he laid before the members the same evidence in regard to the activities of Mr. Totten as was placed before the governor on the occasion of his visit here several days ago.

STUDENTS AROUSED

In the meantime opposition among the students of the university to the attempt to unseat the president is rising.

Proclamations urging support for the president and a boycott of the faculty members who are opposed to him are being distributed by his champions. The position of the students is set forth in the following appeal:

"To the Students of the University of North Dakota:

"You are undoubtedly aware of the plan on foot to oust President Kane from his position as the head of the university. You also know that the men who are fostering this movement are being ably assisted and supported by men on the faculty at the present time. Whether this attitude of our more or less prominent pedagogues is from a selfish motive, we leave to your own judgment. One fact remains and that is that President Kane, as good and true a friend as the students of this institution have ever had, is to be ignominiously expelled.

"Therefore, you are asked as free born Americans and lovers of fair play, to show the faculty of the school where you stand on this proposition. Unless you are president and absolutely need some of the work given by Gillette, Brush, Willis or Libby to graduate, we ask you to refrain from taking any subjects under the above named men, the coming semester.

A plan now is under way to have the student body act as a unit on this matter. You will be approached on your return and given an opportunity to become a member of the 'Kane For President Club,' thereby showing that you are for the president. If you are not for the president then you are for those men who have so treacherously worked against Dr. Kane.

"You can no more ride the fence now than you could during the war. The issue, while not as large, is just as important. Are you going to graduate from a university that flies a red flag from its standards or one that flies the Stars and Stripes? Do you want to go out into the world and tell your friends that your alma mater was a disciple of Goldman and Ives, or that you graduated from a real American institution. The 'Kane For President Club' stands for Americanism to the tenth degree.

CHAPTER OF AMERICAN ENGINEERING SOCIETY EXPECTED TO ACCOMPLISH MUCH FOR MEMBERS OF CRAFT HERE

Following the stag dinner to the professional engineers of the vicinity staged at the Grand Pacific hotel last Thursday, a temporary organization was formed called the Bismarck Engineering society. A petition for a charter and formation of a chapter of the American Association of Engineers with headquarters at Bismarck was signed by over twenty members of that organization, the number required by the petition.

The temporary organization elected the following officers:
President—J. E. Kaulfuss, assistant chief engineer of the North Dakota state highway commission.
Vice president—B. H. Tong, assistant engineer of the city engineering staff.

Secretary—G. F. Lurdigsen, assistant engineer of the state highway commission.
Treasurer—W. S. Stratton, engineer of the state railroad commission.

An executive committee was also chosen to draft a constitution and by-laws and a legislative committee was delegated to begin the drafting of a license law to practice engineering within the state.

The next regular meeting of the new organization will be held on March 12, notice of the place of meeting for which will be announced later than all

at the university and many are also being sent to Governor Frazier and the offices of the administration board at Bismarck.

Among these is one sent from Langdon demanding that Totten be ousted, signed by practically all of the university students and alumni of that town, as well as some 60 other citizens. Another of similar tenor with a large number of signatures has been received from Pembina county.

LEMKE CALLS MEETING

tee are at Bismarck. Any other organization is unauthorized." This statement was made today by R. Seiden Wilcox, state manager, who returned yesterday from a trip to the eastern part of the state where he made arrangements for the Johnson meetings at Grand Forks and Fargo.

North Dakota's three republican slates for the presidential primaries were put in the field by a convention called for Bismarck on January 28 by Gunder Olson; by a second republican convention in opposition to the first which met in Bismarck on February 17, in response to a call issued by seven "republican" members of the republican state central committee, and by an informal gathering of 100 "progressive republicans," representing the league faction, which met in Hillsboro on February 20.

THE YOUNG CONVENTION

The "republican" minority of the republican state central committee, so called because 37 of the 53 members of this body are Nonpartisan League, repudiated the Gunder Olson convention because they professed to find in it hint of an alliance with A. C. Townley, president of the Nonpartisan League. This second convention, dominated by so-called "Young republicans," because Judge N. C. Young was active in arranging for the convention, then proceeded to endorse Gunder Olson for republican national committee man, because convention leaders declared that the Brinton letter, in which this Nonpartisan follower of Townley proposed that the league back him as an independent candidate in opposition to the choice of the two republican conventions, proved that there was no alliance. The endorsement of a national committeeman and of a complete set of alternates and delegates, all of whom are Townley men, and some of whom are in the employ of the league state administration, has tended to further strengthen the conviction that Gunder Olson did not have any bargain with the league.

William Lemke, league chairman of the republican state central committee, has now called a meeting of that body for Bismarck on February 27, in which he says:
"Since the McKenzie-Young soviet representatives of special privilege attempted to burglarize the republican party, hundreds of republicans of all factions who believe in government by majorities have requested me as chairman to call the state central committee together for the purpose of endorsing a candidate for president, a national committeeman, national delegates and presidential electors.

OFFICES DECLARED VACANT

The offices held by Lemke, and by every other league member of the republican state central committee, the county and precinct committees, who number, Lemke declares in his call, 49 for the state, 250 for the counties, and over 1,800 for the precincts, were declared vacant by the Young republicans in convention here February 17, and the regular republican members of the state central committee, numbering about 12, were instructed to organize and to fill all vacancies with republicans opposed to Townley.

The Young republicans endorsed the national committeeman and four of the delegates, nominated by the Gunder Olson republicans January 28. The third ticket nominated at Hillsboro last week, and which probably will be endorsed by the republican state central committee of league affiliation meeting here the 27th, included none of the nominees of either of the previous conventions. Under the state's presidential preference primary act, any candidate for committeeman, delegate or presidential elector who obtains approximately 500 signatures to his petitions must be given a place on the ticket, and there seems to be no question that North Dakota republicans will be called upon March 16 to divide their favors three ways.

League Invades Democracy

For the first time since the league was organized in North Dakota, four years ago, the democratic state organization now faces the same sort of a fight which resulted in the loss of the republican state machine to the league in 1916.


