WORK TO BEGIN SOON ON FINE BANK BUILDING

The building will be one of the handsome bank homes of North Dakota. The entire front will be of Bedford stone, with massive pillars, two feet, ten inches, in diameter extending the entire height of two stories.

GRAND FORKS MAN HEAD OF DAKOTA CHECKER FIENDS

Jamestown, N. D., Feb. 27.—L. H. Nichols of Grand Forks was re-elected president of the North Dakota Checkers' association which closed its annual two days' session here on Wednesday night. A Bjerkness of Parks River was named vice president, and A. T. Jones of Hankinson re-elected secretary and treasurer. A Bjerkness won the checker championship, winning 52 out of 68 games. The next meeting place will be Williston after which Jamestown will become the permanent headquarters and meeting place of the association.

AUTO ACCESSORIES TO BE FARGO MADE

Wind deflectors and shields for motor vehicles will be manufactured in Fargo by a \$125,000 corporation, according to articles of incorporation filed here for the Schonberg Manufacturing company.

Under the terms of the articles, the company will "purchase, lease or otherwise acquire all rights which E. J. Schonberg of Fargo has in and to a certain wind deflector for automobiles patented by Albert Holland, Fargo under a contract already made."

The three directors named, all of Fargo, are E. J. Schonberg, Fred V. Anderson and J. H. Trotter, Jr.
