EXPLAINS ORDER TO CANCEL BOND OF TREASURERS

Head of Fund Says That It Was Not Intended to Coerce Treasurers

POINTS OUT THE LAW

The order of the state bonding department, in notifying treasurers their bonds will be cancelled if they do not renew deposits in the Bank of North Dakota or if they deposit money outside the bank they do not give ample bond, was not intended to coerce treasurers to deposit money in the state bank, according to Harold Hopson, manager of the department.

He said the department may be liable for several thousand dollars of public deposits carried by officials in a closed its doors, and the order was issued as a protection to the state bonding fund. The letter sent to treasurers is as follows:

Cites Initiated Law.

Dear Sir:

Prior to the passage of the initiated law relating to the deposit of public funds at the last general election, Section 7 of Chapter 147 of the Laws of 1919, provided that all county, township, municipal and school district funds should be, by the person having control of such funds, deposited in the Bank of North Dakota.

Section 8, of the same chapter provides: "Whenever any of the public funds heretofore designated shall be deposited in the Bank of North Dakota as heretofore provided, the officer having control and the sureties on the bond of such officer shall be exempt from all liability by reason of loss of any such deposited funds while so deposited."

While Section 7 has been amended, the Bank of North Dakota may still be used as a safe depository for public funds, as Section 8 is still in full force and effect.

Acts Repealed.

Section 25 of Chapter 147, provides that "all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed. The laws that were in effect prior to the passage of this chapter that were in conflict therewith were repealed by the aforesaid Section 25. As a consequence, the boards of county commissioners, township boards, school boards, city councils and other such boards that heretofore held the power of designating depositories, no longer have such power. Therefore, whenever a treasurer makes a deposit in a bank other than the Bank of North Dakota, he is liable in case such funds are lost by the insolvency of such bank.

We are calling your attention to this matter in order to warn you that if you desire to assume the responsibility of making deposits in private banks, it will be necessary that you secure other official bonds, as the State Bonding Fund will no longer guarantee your official conduct, nor protect the municipal corporation of which you were treasurer. The State Bonding Fund was not created for the purpose of guaranteeing bank deposits, and as before stated, if you insist on making deposits in other than the Bank of North Dakota, it will be necessary for you to secure a bond from some other source than with the State Bonding Fund.

Prosecutor's Story of Tragedy as He Will Present It to Jury at the Trial.

Prosecuting Attorney James A. Dilts, who directed proceedings that led to the indictment, says:

"We believe that there was bad feeling between the two lads.

"Cecil, his brother Alfred, who is nine, and Frederick Scherman, who is seven, were playing in the Burkett backyard.

"Bennie Slaviv and his sister, Clara, were in the adjoining yard.

"Cecil called Bennie to come into his yard. Bennie at first objected. Then Cecil held out a kite and tempted Bennie till finally he crossed the line.

"At that Cecil reopened the old squabble and in cold blood shot the younger boy, the bullet entering his right side at the back.

"He committed this crime with a .22-caliber rifle which belonged to the Burkett family.

"I have also been told that he pointed the weapon at Bennie's sister.

"The wounded boy died within 30 hours.

"Frederick Scherman saw Bennie in the gun just before and just after the shooting.

"Frederick, it appears, was at the top of a pole in the Burkett yard inspecting a martin house when the shot was fired."

"My rifle was leaning against the side of the house.

Accused Boy's Account of Shooting As He Will Tell It on Witness Stand.

Other Children Who Will Be Principal Witnesses at the Trial for Murder.

One of these, six-year-old Clara, says Cecil threatened to kill her and Bennie. Eleven-year-old Alfred, too, tells of threats.

And Bennie's parents say that Bennie twice said just before he died, "Mother, Cecil Burkett shot me."

"Cecil killed Bennie, and he did it purposely," says the tragedy victim's father. "He ought to hang for it and I'm going to see that he does."

But Cecil says: "I didn't do it, and I'm not afraid to go to trial. How can they kill me for killing a boy I didn't kill?"

And Cecil's mother verifies her son's story.

When the grand jury returned its indictment the public voiced the criticism that it would have been better to have referred the whole matter to the judge of juvenile court, to be disposed of as are other charges of delinquency.

But Prosecutor Dilts points out that the law doesn't allow such action in cases of murder or treason. The jury may recommend life imprisonment or give the death penalty in all murder cases.

But W. J. Reed, attorney for the Burkett family, says he will "go to bat on the evidence—the boy is telling the truth and the facts will free him."

Quality Wheat

THE LARGEST part of the wheat acreage is now sown to five wheats, of which the Marquis variety is the most popular. Blue Stem is good, but Velvet Chaff, Humpback and other wheats are now practically in the discard on account of the poor returns which they have brought.

It is absolutely necessary to maintain the quality of our fine milling wheat. If we do not do so, we will lose the great revenue from our leading money crop and the flour demanded by bakers and others will be made from Canadian or winter wheat.

Fortunately Marquis Leads Both in Quality and Quantity

It is imperative that some Marquis be grown by every farmer because if 1921 should be a comparatively rust-free year, it will pay better than any other crop.

We wish to appeal to you to keep your seed wheat pure. Even the dummers are getting so badly mixed that the dummers-millers state that it is almost impossible to make a good quality of macaroni flour from the mixture.

Another great danger is that the different kinds of wheat, both hard spring bread wheat and durum macaroni wheat are also becoming mixed, and while each might be excellent, when mixed they become practically worthless for milling.

D-5 or red rust proof wheat is worthless for either bread making or macaroni and we strongly advise farmers to leave it alone. It is true that a few cars of it sold at a fancy price solely on account of weight in mixing it with light weight wheat for export.

This was merely putting "sand in sugar" and foreign buyers are already discriminating against such wheat.

We Recommend That You

1. Avoid all mixtures.
2. Fan and clean the wheat from weed seeds, trash and shriveled kernels.
3. Treat with formaldehyde to prevent smut.
4. Dig up all the barberries on your place and encourage your neighbors to do likewise.
5. Make blotting paper germination tests to be sure your wheat will grow.
6. Put your soil in prime condition.
7. Seed Marquis as early as possible.
