KEEPS LONELY VIGIL

Girl Has Task of Guarding Forests From Fire.

Former Newspaper Woman Has Spent Two Summers in Quiet Lookout on Top of Mountains.

Denver.—Following two successful seasons, during which pretty Miss Helen Dove of this city, in her capacity of forest fire lookout, has discovered more than a score of incipient blazes, officials of the National Forest service are convinced that women are equally qualified as men in the art of chasing down the tiny wisps of smoke that sometimes lead to serious conflagrations in the thickly wooded districts of the Rocky mountains. Miss Dove is the only member of her sex in the West who holds the position of forest fire lookout.

From June until late October Miss Dove lives on the summit of Devil's Head peak, 9,300 feet high above sea level and 65 miles southwest of Denver.

From sunrise to sunset Miss Dove scans the horizon, sweeping the thousands of acres of forest land beneath her powerful glass, constantly alert for the least sign of smoke, which often means birth of the terror of the timber country—the forest fire.

There are no Sundays or holidays for Miss Dove. Occasionally, after a heavy downpour of rain or when clouds obscure the earth below, she gets a brief respite. Going to the fire lookout station early in summer, she must cook her own meals and perform all the work necessary to keep her cabin and lookout station in repair. She must chop her own firewood and carry her own water. Previous to assuming her duties as forest fire lookout, Miss Dove was a Denver newspaper woman.

30 REPORTED KILLED BY TORNADO

Storm Sweeps Through District of Georgia Destroying Property

Oconee, Ga., Feb. 11.—The death toll in yesterday's tornado which swept through the Gardner settlement near here remained today at about thirty. Many of the dead have been sent to nearby points and scores of the injured were in hospitals. The list of fatalities included only two whites, a number of the injured, chiefly negroes, were expected to die.

Relief has been sent from Atlanta and nearby towns, and the injured and homeless were being cared for by the Red Cross and civic organizations. In some cases entire families were wiped out.

The region visited by the tornado was completely devastated. It is an area nearly five miles long and half mile wide.

The chief property damage occurred at the plant of the Cleveland-Oconee Lumber company, where most of the storm victims were employed. A large part of the plant was destroyed and millions of feet of lumber scattered for hundreds of yards.

ARMISTICE DAY HOLIDAY BILL GETS SETBACK

day. Senator Stevens, the father of an American Legion member, said that he believed the amendment was proper; that the memorial for heroes of the World War should properly be observed on May 30.

Not For the Military.
Senator McNair also favored the bill as amended. He talked of the custom of the old Roman emperors in celebrating the anniversary of victories, declaring that in this country the victories of the people, and not the generals, are celebrated.

"Would you favor abolishing the Fourth of July?" asked Senator Murphy.

"No," replied McNair. "Then why oppose celebrating Armistice Day?" retorted Murphy.

Senator Frasier said that in many of the smaller towns veterans of the war want to have celebrations on Armistice Day and he favored complying with their desire.

Senator Frasier suggested that, if necessary, some of the minor holidays might be abolished, as there seemed to be an opinion prevailing among many senators that too many legal holidays are being created. He suggested Discovery Day, or some other holiday, might be abolished, declared he didn't believe I. P. O'Connor would be in the senate, would oppose abolishing Discovery Day as a holiday to permit Nov. 11, being made a holiday.

Accept Amendments.
The senate accepted the report of the conference committee on House Bill No. 5, the Volstead companion bill. The amendment prohibits sale of keg malt. Senator Liederbach opposed this, saying he thought the amendment would give the bottling companies a monopoly on the sale of malt, which can only be sold in bottles, under the law. The house also accepted the conference report and this bill, for which prohibition forces worked, will go to the governor for signature.

House bill 66, providing for the payment of tuition by one school district to another by the instruction of non-residents passed, 41 to 8. A motion to reconsider was defeated.

Advance Bonus Bill.
The soldiers' bonus bill which passed the house was reported out by a senate committee with a minor amendment, recommended for passage, and the committee report was accepted.

The house of representatives passed several measures, among them the criminal syndicalism bill aimed at the I. W. W. organization. The discussion was brief and the vote was 90 to 15.
