# 15 KILLED BY GERMAN POLICE

Essen, Germany, Mar. 29.—(By Associated Press.)—Fifteen rioters were killed and forty others wounded in the clash with the security police here. The attempt to bring on a general strike in this region has so far failed. "Exceptional status" has been proclaimed from Dortmund, Boshum, Cefenkirchen, and other points in Rhenish, Prussia.

Exceptional status referred to is probably identical to a state of siege, which has been instituted by German authorities in points affected by Communist activities.

# NORMAL TO GIVE DEGREE

Valley City, N. D., March 29.—The Valley City normal will become the state teachers' college of Valley City, after July 1, 1921, and will give four years' college work beyond high school, in accordance with the sanction of the state board of administration under a new law.

The college will give the degree of Bachelor of Arts entitling the holder to a first grade professional certificate without examination. The same as the state university and similar institutions. Entrance requirements will remain the same and shorter courses will be offered the same as formerly.



# SELLS FARM FOR \$90,000

The farm which consists of 4,000 acres, is considered one of the model farms of North Dakota the buildings being modern in every respect. Several years ago the \$5,000 prize offered by the late James J. Hill for the most successful farm on the Great Northern railway lines was won by Mr. Nelson.

Rev. Rood was pastor for some time at Moorhead, Minn., and at Minot, N. D. He has served as assistant superintendent of the Congregational Home missions board with headquarters at Dickinson.

Medora, N. # AIR CONSUMERS STORE TROUBLE SOON AT MINOT

Company Official Says that \$981,000 Worth of Stock Is Sold

Fargo, N. D., March 29.—Hearing on the financial condition of the cooperative stores company (organized by the Nonpartisan League in North Dakota) will be held April 9 in the state district court at Minot. The company, which recently went into voluntary receivership, continued to do business with W. G. Johnson of this city, its secretary-treasurer, as receiver.

This is the fourth year of the Consumers United Stores, and it is today operating 37 stores and a creamery. It has 10,000 members, according to Mr. Johnson, and "with any kind of crops and any kind of prices this year will overcome its financial difficulties."

Mr. Johnson attributed these principally to drought and five years of crop failures in western North Dakota. He said that the company had issued stock to the amount of \$981,000 and that \$690,000 was represented by unpaid notes. Most of these notes, he said, were held against farmers in the northwestern part of the state where the drought had hit hardest.

Other reasons given by Mr. Johnson as contributing to the company's prices, a slump in business caused by straits, were the collapse in grain and the mid-winter falling prices which caught the company with stock bought at high prices.

Goods handled consist mostly of groceries, shoes, tires, work clothing, kitchen utensils, and made to order suits.

The company's largest creditors are the closed Scandinavian-American Bank of Fargo, and the People's State Bank of Grand Forks, both of which are regarded as friendly to the Nonpartisan League. The cooperative company owes the first named bank \$100,000 and the latter \$12,000, its total owed to banks aggregated \$300,000.

# FOSTER NAMED AN ASSISTANT ATTORNEY-GEN.

George K. Foster, a Bismarck lawyer, has received a commission as an assistant attorney-general. Foster came to North Dakota about four years ago from Illinois holding a position under Wm. Langer, Attorney General Lenke still has one more assistant to appoint. Former Judge Crum, who came to North Dakota from Montana has been working in the attorney general office but does not hold a regular appointment.

Southport, Eng., March 29.—The Independent Labor party rejected by a overwhelming vote a proposal to accept Lenin's 21 conditions for affiliation with the third international of Moscow.

# BOARD REJECTS WAGE HEARING

Chicago, March 29.—The United States labor board today declined to permit the Industrial Traffic Association to enter the wage case now before the board. Hearing the petitioners would not be helpful or in the public interest said the board. The decision also argued to permit this organization as a party to the question would result in opening the cases to many other parties.

# EARLY MORNING FIRE DESTROYS OLD BUILDINGS

 commission early in the fire, a lot of people narrowly escaping a drenching as the water sprayed Fifth street. A new line of hose soon was stretched. The city recently ordered 500 feet of new hose for the fire department to replace hose unable to withstand a heavy pressure.

Firemen poured thousands of gallons of water into the buildings from adjoining roofs, the rear front and sides, through window glass which was shattered by the force of the streams, holes chopped in the walls of the building and the roofs. An unruly hose caused a couple of firemen to get a drenching when it slipped out of their hands. Water spouted in all directions as the hose floundered around on the pavement and spectators scampered to safe distances.

# Sees Store Burn.

R. C. Rosen, whose corner store was gutted by the flames, watched the flames envelope the interior of the building, particularly in the rear where there was a stock of sheep. Rosen and some others had carried out some show cases and racks containing seventy-five or a hundred suits of clothes out of the burning building. The roof of this corner building collapsed after the building had been burning for more than an hour.

The blaze burned most fiercely, it appeared, at the juncture of the Rosen store building and the vacant Fifth Street Stationary store building, toward the front. Firemen entered the first floor of the stationary store building and sent a stream of water up the stairway between the first and second buildings into the heart of the fire.

Coleman Saves Stock.

# To the voters of the City of Bismarck

The Bismarck Water Supply Company has had called to its attention a printed circular under date of March 25th, 1921, setting forth the views of certain candidates for the City Commission with reference to the Bismarck Water Supply Company and their candidacy at the coming city election. To the end that the voters of the City may not be misinformed as to the position of the Bismarck Water Supply Company with reference to the issues of the coming election it now makes the following plain statement:

The Bismarck Water Supply Company had no part in bringing about the candidacy of any candidate at the coming election. Not one of the candidates is under any obligation to the water company. The Bismarck Water Supply Company will ask only fair treatment from the candidates after election, and so far as it is advised none of the candidates, after election, can grant the water company any favors, if they wished to do so, for reasons as follows:

The matter of fixing rates for water is exclusively within the jurisdiction of the Railroad Commission of the State of North Dakota, not of the City Commission. The question of needed improvements, practices and usage of the Company with reference to fire protection, filtration, services, connections, and all police requirements is exclusively within the jurisdiction of the railroad commission and not the City Commission.

The water company calls especial attention and quotes the following from said circular:

"We believe the City should own and operate its own water system and with this in mind, we believe the city should purchase the plant of the Bismarck Water Supply Company at a reasonable price, when financial and business conditions will permit, and after purchase to remodel and add to the plant such parts and equipment needed to furnish clean and wholesome water and ample fire protection, at actual cost to the city and its inhabitants.

In the event of failure to obtain the plant of the Bismarck Water Supply Company at a reasonable price, we believe the City should proceed to complete and install a complete new water system as soon as the financial and business conditions warrant it."

Answering the views of the aforesaid candidates, the Bismarck Water Supply Company will make plain its position with reference thereto. The Bismarck Water Supply Company is and has been ready to sell to the City of Bismarck its water plant at a reasonable, fair price. There are only two methods by which the City of Bismarck can acquire the water plant: One, by arbitration as provided in its charter, which the City and the water company have both subscribed and agreed to, under which the city will appoint one arbitrator, the water company one, and those two will appoint a third; and if they cannot agree on the third, then the third arbitrator is to be appointed by the Judge of the United States District Court of North Dakota; Second, by a suit in court to condemn the plant, in which the price will be fixed by a jury of twelve men. This second method can now be used under a new law passed by the recent legislature. Either of the two methods is entirely satisfactory to the water company. In other words if the City of Bismarck wishes to purchase the water plant the water company is ready and willing to have the price fixed either by arbitration by a committee of three as provided in the charter, or by a jury of twelve men selected in court. Therefore, the water company fails to see where in it is an issue in the coming campaign.

There is still pending in the courts, against the water company, in which the City of Bismarck is plaintiff, two lawsuits, one to cancel its charter, and one contesting the valuation of its property as fixed by the railroad commission. Until such suits are finally disposed of the Company is prevented from either making improvements or having a policy.

In conclusion the water company hopes that the voters of the City of Bismarck will vote for such of the candidates as in their judgment will serve the best interests of the city, without reference to the water company.
