

EX-EMPRESS IS BURIED WITH 4 SONS PRESENT

Kaiser Wilhelm and Crown Prince Missing From Ceremony

Potsdam, April 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Amid the tolling of bells which marked the solemn hour funeral services for Augusta Victoria, former German Empress were held here in this, the royal residence suburb of Berlin, which had witnessed so many scenes of splendor in the departed days of Hohenzollern. Over the simple coffin resting on the Potsdam palace grounds where the services were held had been raised the familiar yellow

standard of the ex-empress and at its foot stood the four sons of the former royal couple who were free to attend the services. Lacking was the presence of the husband, the former emperor, Crown Prince Frederick Wilhelm, exiled in Holland. Led by the clergy and officers of the ex-empress' own regiment the funeral cortege left Wild Park, the Potsdam railway station, near which the body had been guarded overnight by faithful mourners after its arrival by special train from Doorn.

deal of money. This was referred to the city attorney.

O'Hare's Explanation.

A letter from H. E. O'Hare, city attorney, referring to charges made during the campaign regarding his actions as city attorney in matters in which the Hughes Electric Company was concerned was read. In a lengthy communication Mr. O'Hare referred to the petition of F. O. Hellstrom and others to have annulled the rates which the electric company put into effect after the railroad commission had declined to approve the schedule. He said that the railroad commission would have the matter up again on valuation on April 25 and that he believed the commission on its own motion could be depended upon to give a fair valuation and decision. He complained that Hellstrom had not asked aid of the city commission or notified it of his proposed action and thought that in the future anyone making complaint on utility rates should come first to the city commission. He said that his law partner, Mr. Cox, had been engaged by the Hughes Electric company in the matter, that he was willing to appear and represent the city but that he brought the matter to the commission's attention so that it might get additional counsel if desired.
