MINOT AND BISMARCK TO CLASH HERE IN 3 BIG BASEBALL GAMES

Magic City Team Comes With All-Salaried Team and a Strong Record

ASK LOCAL SUPPORT

Three big days of baseball open in Bismarck tomorrow. Minot's fast professional team, which has been playing regularly for several weeks, comes to Bismarck for three games.

The game Saturday will begin at 6 P. M. The game Sunday will begin at 4 P. M., and the game Monday will begin at 4:30 P. M.

Saturday's game will mark Bismarck's second and the real opening of the new baseball park. The management expects to see a record crowd. The Sunday game will be played as late as possible in the afternoon, after the Memorial parade. The Monday game also will begin late in the afternoon.

Al Anderson and Lefty Higgins are ready to pitch for Bismarck tomorrow. Manager Harper will not make his decision until just before the game.

Secretary H. F. Keller, of the local club, announced that the final drive for money for the team will be made Saturday. It was set for a week ago but was postponed. The fans committee believes that generous support will be accorded the appeal for enough money to put the proposition where it should be, as the management has gathered a fine bunch of players.

The chief expense to the local club was the building of the new park. It is believed that with continued good support the team itself will become self-supporting. On all the games played in Bismarck on a percentage basis—this will be done with Minot in games here and at Minot—the grandstand admission is not split, but goes to the local club, and the more people in the grandstand the more profit to the club.

An attendance of at least 1,000 at each one of the big Minot games is anticipated.

NEW CHAMP IS WINNER OVER JOE STECHER

Kansas City, Mo., May 27.—Stanislaus Zyzsko, now heavyweight wrestling champion, successfully defended his title here last night by defeating Joe Stecher of Nebraska in straight falls. The first fall came after 1 hour 50 minutes and 20 seconds and the second after 13 minutes 20 seconds of wrestling.

A HUMANE CONSTABLE



French Almond Omelet

4 eggs, 4 tablespoons milk, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon shredded almonds. Beat egg just enough to blend the whites and yolks, add milk and seasonings. Put butter in hot omelet pan; when melted cover bottom of pan with the shredded blanched almonds and turn in the egg mixture. As it cooks, stick it with a fork and raise it up, until it is of a creamy consistency—increase the heat under the pan so the omelet will brown quickly underneath. Fold and turn out on a hot platter.
