

BURTNESS PILOTS N. D. LAND BILLS TO SUCCESSFUL END

Washington, Aug. 3.—Congressmen O. B. Burtness has piloted three bills through the house on behalf of the public lands' committee all of which he had reported and handled on the floor and which are of general interest to the people of North Dakota.

One amends the enabling act of North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and Washington so as to permit these states to lease their school lands which have been found mineral in character for a period not to exceed twenty years on such terms as the legislatures may prescribe, leasing of agricultural and grazing lands is still limited to five years. The states are also given the right to grant easements over their school lands for highways and other public uses for which lands of private individuals can be acquired in eminent domain proceedings.

Railroad Right of Way.
The second bill grants railroads rights of way over public lands which have been forfeited or abandoned and which would otherwise revert to the federal government to the patentee of the legal subdivision in which situated or has successor in interest except in cities and villages where the land is granted to the municipality and except also that the right is expressly reserved to all public authorities to establish legal highways on such abandoned right of way within one year after decree of forfeit or abandonment.

The third bill makes it possible to sell isolated tracts of public lands remaining in the Fort Berthold reservation in western North Dakota and eastern Montana thus getting such isolated tracts into private hands and upon the tax lists of the various counties.


