KENNEDY CASE TO GRAND JURY BY TOMORROW

Mrs. Obenchain and Burch Still Held in Jail in Connection With Case

SHOOTING STORY TOLD Woman Reiterates That Men Stepped Out of Buses and Shot Her Fiance

Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 10.—The Kennedy slaying case in connection with which Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain, fiancee of the dead broker, J. B. Kennedy, and Arthur Burch, her college friend and class-mate of the dead man, are being held in jail is expected to go before the county grand jury tomorrow.

The details of the recent shooting of Kennedy on the steps of his summer home in Beverly Glen, near here, were told to a coroner's jury here yesterday afternoon.

While the inquest was in progress, District Attorney Thomas L. Woolwine conferred personally and without witnesses, with Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain, the young divorced woman who was with Kennedy when he was shot and who has since been known as a material witness.

Mrs. Obenchain talked to newspaper men for the first time since the tragedy. She continued to decline, however, to say why she had summoned Burch here from Evanston, Ill.

"You know, of course, that you will in all probability be indicted for murder?" the young woman was asked by newspaper men.

With her eyelids fluttering, her mouth twisting and her hand pressed to her heart, she answered: "Shaken by Loss."

"I don't care what they do. I don't care what happens to me. I thought too much of Mr. Kennedy and was too much shaken by the loss of him to think about myself."

Mrs. Obenchain said she had made a "conscientious effort" to assist the district attorney and the sheriff's office to unravel the mystery and had not known until she read the newspapers that she was under suspicion.

"It was staggering," she said, "to think I had been fooled this way, but it is a matter of entire indifference to me what they do or how they twist my statements."

Mrs. Obenchain repeated her initial statement that she saw two men in the bushes near the cottage at the time of the shooting, adding that she believed they were "foreigners."

Fled After Shooting "They passed very close to me as they fled after the shooting and I could see they were tall, dark and shabbily dressed," she said.

She said that after the first shot rang out she screamed and Kennedy cried out: "Good night, Madalynne." Then a second shot was fired, the men fled and she ran to Kennedy, took his hand and said, "Belton, speak to me, for God's sake. Speak to me." Finding he was inanimate she ran for help she said.

"I only know that I have lost Belton."

Mrs. Obenchain said it was true she had summoned Burch to Los Angeles from the east, but said it was only through a natural desire to have a friend visit this city.

She denied she visited Burch in his room in a local hotel although investigators declared she had been identified as a woman seen there with Burch.
