WINS \$100,000 OF DAKOTAN'S LARGE ESTATE

Los Angeles Woman to Get One-third of Estate of S. H. Knight of Casselton

Fargo, N. D., Aug. 13.—Mrs. Louise G. Knight, of Los Angeles, Calif., will receive one-third of the \$300,000 estate of the late S. H. Knight, of Casselton, N. D., as his lawful wife, according to a decision of Judge William C. Hook, United States Circuit Court of Appeals, the decision being announced here today. Judge Hook made the decision shortly before he died in Wisconsin this week.

The case has been in the courts since 1917. Relatives of Mr. Knight, who was married five times, tried to prevent Mrs. Knight from securing any of the estate on the ground that she was not his lawful wife. The case hinged on some technical incompleteness of divorce formalities by which Mrs. Knight had been freed of a former husband named Bontoy in California.

New-Fangled Contraptions Spoil Camp Life, Firestone Says

BY EDWARD THIERRY. Akron, Ohio, Aug. 13.—Harvey S. Firestone, tire king, knows how Frankenstein felt when his mechanical man went on a rampage. Firestone organized a little camping trip so he, Henry Ford and Thomas A. Edison could get close to nature. And he organized it so well that it became a camp de luxe, with the president of the United States as a guest.

"Why, I felt like a maitre d'hotel!" Firestone exclaimed as he returned to Akron. "Just to play safe we took 50 cots—and one night 49 cots were in use. On our record day in camp we fed 90! 'The simple life! Why, I worked harder looking after cots and tents and food than I ever did making tires. Too Many Comforts. 'The thing got bigger every time I turned around. I was so anxious to make everyone comfortable that I wound up by having too many comforts. Fifteen were in camp while President Harding and Secretary Christian were along, including five members of the Firestone family, four of the Ford family, Mr. and Mrs. Edison, Bishop W. F. Anderson and his wife. There were secret service men, photographers, movie men, cooks, tent handlers, chauffeurs and hostlers. 'Things went like clockwork," said Firestone. "I like things that way—even in camp. But I prefer to rough it. Getting back to nature—the real thing—is the best vacation. Once Roughed It. 'We really roughed it when our camping trips first started. Edison proposed the first trip. He and I went together. It was a new stunt for me. I was so soft I nearly died from the cold that first night. We were in the White Mountains. 'We really got close to nature. Later, Henry Ford and John Burroughs joined us. Each year, without exactly realizing it, we added some little comfort to the trip. 'We took turns planning the trip. This year it was my job. Before we got through I felt like a Cook's tour guide!"

POWERS FAVOR NEW LEAGUE

Small Countries, Too, Would Welcome New Covenant Including America

London, Aug. 12.—"Show me!" That will be the attitude of all the European statesmen when they meet in Washington for president Harding's conference on disarmament and Pacific ocean questions. "The powers illustrate the old saying, 'Once bit, twice shy.' They feel they were bit once. At Versailles they saw President Wilson and his secretary of state put their signatures to a League of Nations agreement. And then they saw the Senate turn down the whole business.

This time, before they do any signing, they will want to see Harding and Hughes sign and the O. K. of the Senate, too. Not till then will they be ready to append their own signatures. But they do expect agreement will be easier than in the Wilson case, because Harding has the Senate with him.

Favor New League

If President Harding, after getting agreements on disarmament and Pacific problems, wants to go a step farther and broach his Association of Nations in place of Wilson's League of Nations, preserving mainly the Permanent Court of International Justice, he will meet with far less opposition than is generally supposed. The 40 nations in the league don't care about the name of the organization, its form or its constitution, so long as the United States comes in. And there are indications that they are ready to agree to America making all the reservations it wants.

The main thing is the tax ridden power of the world, together with all the little countries, want protection against further wars.

That will mean partial disarmament, lower taxes, more money for peaceful pursuits.

League Very Busy The League of Nations Council has met 13 times. Its assembly met last November-December in Geneva and is to meet again in September.

It has held a financial conference in Brussels and a transit conference at Barcelona. It has settled one serious dispute between two nations, Sweden and Finland, which seemed on the verge of warring over the Aland Islands. It has staved off a war between Poland and Lithuania over Vilna. It has repaired through the Nansen committee about 350,000 war prisoners.

It has started an anti-typhus campaign in Poland and other sections of eastern Europe. It is governing two internationalized areas, Danzig and the Saar Basin. It is taking measures to keep Austria from dying.

And it has taken preliminary steps to form a permanent court of international justice. But it can't function as it should till the United States enters.
