TRIFLING WITH LOVE LEADS TO MURDER

Love rules the court, the camp, the grove, And men below, and saints above, For love is heaven, and heaven is love.

By Newspaper Enterprise Los Angeles, Aug. 16.—Beautiful 28-year-old Madalynne Obenchain, held in jail here in connection with the murder of John B. Kennedy, young insurance broker, has used love as her playing ever since her college days at Northwestern University in Illinois.

As a co-ed at Northwestern, Madalynne Connor had more beaux than the average girl of 20, according to those who knew her then.

The morning following Kennedy's death Burch left Los Angeles and was taken from an eastbound train by officials in Las Vegas, N. M. He is now held in jail here as a material witness, pending further investigation.

Two years ago Obenchain, then an attorney in Chicago, came to Los Angeles and he and Madalynne were married on Jan. 1, 1919. They lived together until April, when Obenchain went back east. Madalynne followed him shortly and in a few weeks they were divorced.

Obenchain has said since that he permitted Madalynne to divorce him because he had learned she was interested in Kennedy, and that he loved her too much to stand in the way of her happiness.

Following the arrest of Mrs. Obenchain in connection with the murder, Obenchain took the first train west to aid in her defense.

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GUARANTY FUND BODY TO MEET ON TOLLEY BANK

Will Be Asked to Approve Audit Which Has Been Made of Deposits

A special meeting of the guaranty fund commission will be called to approve an audit of the Tolley State Bank, preparatory to paying off depositors under the guaranty of bank deposits act, according to O. E. Lofthus, state examiner and secretary of the commission.

The total amount due depositors, according to the audit which is in Mr. Lofthus' hands, is \$192,195.14. A considerable amount of deposits will not be given benefit of the fund because the bank had agreed to pay more than 6 per cent interest on them, according to the examiner, the guaranty fund commission having decided that deposits on which more than the legal rate of interest is offered are not subject to the benefit of the fund.

There has been long delay in the preparations for paying off the depositors of the first of the banks which failed, the Tolley bank having been the first to close its doors last fall when a number of banks closed. The delay, Mr. Lofthus said, has been occasioned by the necessity for a special audit of the bank.

The money with which to pay off depositors is on deposit in the hands of the Bank of North Dakota.

On July 15 it was stated that the guaranty fund amounted to about \$308,000. It had been openly charged by many private bankers that the money was drawn into the Bank of North Dakota from the private banks at a time when the Bank of North Dakota was exhausted of cash.

Mr. Lofthus at that time denied that the money had been drawn into the Bank of North Dakota to help it in a crisis or that the money would not be available when needed.

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REFUSE CALL TO WM. M'ADOO

Washington, Aug. 16.—The senate interstate commerce commission refused to call William G. McAdoe, former director-general of railroads to give expert testimony on the administration of the railroads funding bill. The motion to call Mr. McAdoe was made by Senator Stanley, Democrat, Kentucky, and La Follette, Republican, Wisconsin, supporting it.

HILLS TRAIL IS ORGANIZED

Road Will Be Blazed From Lake Metigoshe to Black Hills The Lake Metigoshe-Black Hills trail is in existence today, supported by a national organization.

The meeting held at Mandan yesterday to boost the trail concluded with the decision to have an inter-state association to control the trail, the trail to run from Lake Metigoshe near the Canadian border in Bottineau county, through Bottineau, Minot, Max, Washburn, Wilton, Bismarck, Mandan, Flasher and into South Dakota to the Black Hills.

Ultimately it is proposed to extend the trail from Winnipeg to Denver. F. W. Mees, of Morton county, was named head of the national association and Thomas Sullivan, of Mandan, was chosen secretary-treasurer. A separate organization for North Dakota alone was formed with A. D. Ertresvaag of Bottineau, president.

It is proposed to raise \$3,000 to blaze the trail. The design adopted was a white Indian head on a black background with white bands.
