

## NESTOS LEADS FRAZIER BY 17,000 NESTOS THANKS VOTERS FOR CONFIDENCE

### NESTOS VOICES THANKS TO ALL WHO AIDED HIM

Candidate Says That He Respects Confidence Imposed on Him by People of N. D.

STATES HIS PROGRAM  
Declares He Will Endeavor to Redeem Pledges of the Independent Platform

Ragnvald A. Nestos, at his home in Minot, issued the following statement this afternoon:

"Now that the returns definitely establish a victory for the independent forces and program, it is my desire as the candidate of the Independents for the governorship of North Dakota to express my appreciation for the confidence reposed in me by the men and women who by their votes have elected me governor of the state and to assure them that in the administration of the office, it shall be my constant aim and effort to redeem the pledges of the platform and the promises made during the campaign. I realize keenly the magnitude of the problems and difficulties confronting the new administration and that the loyal, unselfish and intelligent cooperation of the citizenship of the commonwealth will be required in order to insure a satisfactory solution of these problems.

"In the administration of the governors office and in the management of the public business I shall have no enemies to punish and no scores to settle and it is my purpose to be the governor of all the people and to make evident by my administrative acts, that in the management of the educational, charitable and penal institutions of our state in the building and operation of the mill and elevator at Grand Forks, in the establishment of a system of rural credits, in the liquidation of The Bank of North Dakota and in the examination and supervision of banks of the state, whether closed or open, that the state is entering upon a period of construction and cooperative effort in rehabilitating the business of the state, and that in this process every legitimate calling whether in town or country will have a chance to prosper and the avenue of opportunity be kept open for all our people as far as it is possible for an administration to promote and realize such an ideal. By following such a course and by securing for the management of the states business the most capable North Dakotans that can be had for the meager salaries offered and by insisting upon honesty, efficiency, economy and publicity in the conduct of the public business, the expenditure of the public funds and the keeping of the public records, I am sure that North Dakota will once more secure the confidence of the people of other states and that as a result there will be speedily re-established."

### BURLEIGH WILL GIVE FRAZIER BIG MAJORITY

Will Have Majority in County of About 450 on Full Returns

FRAZIER GAINS IN CITY  
League Vote Shows Increase and Independent Vote a Big Slump in Bismarck

Burleigh county will give Governor Frazier a majority of between 450 and 500, it appeared today with 44 out of 58 precincts reported.

The heaviest losses sustained in the Independent vote appeared to be in Burleigh and Morton counties, in the early returns, with some other counties in this section of the state also showing a loss for Nestos over the O'Connor vote.

Many Bismarck voters did not go to the polls yesterday. This is shown by the fact that the total vote cast in the city on the gubernatorial candidates was 2,881 in the recall election compared to 3,249 cast in the general election a year ago.

The majority of R. A. Nestos in the city, a total of 685 on complete official returns was 652 votes less than the majority of O'Connor over Frazier last year. Nestos turned over 162 to 160 while a year ago Frazier got 161 to O'Connor's 159.

### TOWNLEY WON'T DISCUSS FUTURE

Declines to Comment on Effect of Nonpartisan Defeat in North Dakota

Fargo, Oct. 29.—League leaders here refused to comment except to reiterate that "the vote from the Missouri slope would tell the story" and "we are going to wait for the complete returns."

A. C. Townley, president of the National Nonpartisan league, came to Fargo today but he refused to say whether he was to be in on another victory for the organization he founded or witness its death-throes as a political power in this state.

### BOARD PROBES RAIL DISPUTE

Issued Decision on Hearing to Determine Responsibility

Chicago, Oct. 29.—The U. S. Railroad Labor Board today issued its decision in the hearing held Wednesday to determine the responsibility for the general strike threatened by the four Brotherhoods and Switchmen's union.

The board found: First: That all such disputes must be referred to the board before any action is taken. Second: That any interruption of traffic would be a blow aimed at the peace, prosperity and safety of the entire nation.

### TAX REVISION BILL HELD UP

Washington, Oct. 29.—Republican senate leaders conceded today that there was no possibility of passing the tax revision bill at this session. They also indicated that there was little prospect of maintaining a quorum of the senate tonight.



### 471 RURAL PRECINCTS MISSING IS NOT EXPECTED TO WIPE OUT LEAD OF INDEPENDENTS

Other Candidates Run About Even With Nestos—Sveinbjorn Johnson Running Ahead in Some Counties—Initiated Laws and Amendments Also Holding up in Vote of Independents—Big Victory is Claimed for Nestos by I. V. A.

R. A. Nestos passed the 100,000 mark in the tabulation of the votes at 4 o'clock this afternoon, and his election appeared to be certain by a majority of several thousand.

The tabulation, with 471 precincts missing, showed: Nestos 102,189; Frazier 84,980.

With 187,169 votes accounted for, Nestos' majority had been cut by Governor Frazier to 17,209.

With the comparison of the vote of last year and the estimated vote out in the rural precincts yet not heard from, there seemed a remote chance, Nonpartisans maintained, that Governor Frazier could overcome the great lead of Mr. Nestos, which the Independents declare elect him beyond a doubt.

With the election of the Independent candidate for Governor, the voters of the state also would part into office Sveinbjorn Johnson for Attorney-General and Joseph A. Kitchen for Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor, and adopt the complete Independent program of laws, with the possible exception of the election laws, as the vote throughout was about the same.

The Valley Vote  
The vote which went heavily for Nestos in the cities and in the Red River valley began to recede this afternoon rapidly as the strong Nonpartisan precincts of the western part of the state rolled in. There were so many instances of a gain for Nestos over the O'Connor vote in the rural precincts that it appeared that the majority of Mr. Nestos could not be wiped out.

With Independent headquarters in Fargo preparing a celebration, Mr. Nestos issuing a statement and Independents of Dickinson wiring President Harding for permission "for the readmission of North Dakota into the United States" the league headquarters refused to concede victory, and declared they would wait until the rural vote was in.

Where Tide Turned  
Governor Frazier did not care to express a statement this afternoon and appeared to be busier digging into a mass of correspondence that accumulated during the campaign than in his own fate in the election.

The facts which accounted for Mr. Nestos' lead where the big gain in the rural vote in the Red River country, the slump in the league vote in the north and northwestern parts of the state and overturns in some other rural precincts.

The hotbeds of Nonpartisanism turned in majorities about as usual, according to reports, although there were instances where townships turned completely over. Governor Frazier gained in many towns and cities, and also in some rural precincts.

Losses and Gains.  
The first reported received from Golden Valley county in the extreme western part of the state said that Frazier lost about 12 per cent over last year in the rural precincts that had been reported. He was, however, running about even with last year in Stark county.

Throughout the Slope, Frazier held his own or gained over last year. He showed a decided gain in Morton county, in Grant county he gained 79 in the first nine precincts, and gained in some precincts reported in Hettinger and Adams counties. He also showed a gain in McIntosh and Emmons, Divide Sheridan and Burleigh counties. He was expected to have a 1,000 majority in McLean county, and about the same as last year in Kidder.

Nestos got 4,968 lead in 68 precincts in Cass county, including the city of Fargo. He gained 253 in Steele county, 300 in Benson county, gained in LaMoure, 413 in Ramsey, with 42 out of 56 precincts reported, slightly in Rolette.

The Independents made a gain in Stutsman county over last year, and had gained in 21 precincts reported in Mountrail county.

Losses on Slope  
Losses to the I. V. A. in Burleigh and Morton counties were among the surprises of the election. City of Mandan complete gave Nelson 1020 and Frazier 635 or a loss to the Independents of 241.

In Stark county Nestos secured 1146 against Frazier's 490 in eight out of 28 precincts. Dickinson vote was 899 to 473 compared to 978 for O'Connor and 532 for Frazier.

Gains in Morton  
It is estimated that Morton county will go 300 stronger for the league than last fall.

The I. V. A. showed gains in the Red River Valley early in the evening, but toward morning the rural returns began to reduce them somewhat.

Cuts Down Grand Forks  
Take Grand Forks for instance. It started out with more than 3,000 lead for Nestos. With 10 rural precincts to be heard from at 2:30 a. m. this morning the lead in Grand Forks county had been cut to 2,601 with 10 precincts of Frazier's country to be heard from.

Haste in gathering the figures shows many apparent discrepancies which only a checking up against official returns can determine.

Nestos' adherents were jubilant shortly after midnight.

Increases in Valley  
The I. V. A. increases in the Red River Valley and the League gains on the Slope were the surprises of the election that upset the calculations of those who were able in past elections to predict with reasonable sureness. The great slump in the vote also complicated the situation.
