At the first national convention of the Women's Auxiliary to the American Legion held at Kansas City, Mo., it was decided to change the name of the organization to the American Legion Auxiliary.

Mrs. Hobart of Ohio, was elected national president. North Dakota was very active in the election of Mrs. Hobart. One of the main planks of Mrs. Hobart's platform is to have a hospitalization committee with a member from each state. When one state has some of North Dakota's boys in their hospitals they are to get in touch with our member of the committee and as far as possible have the wounded boys exchanged so they may be in their own state.

The national headquarters of the organization will be at Indianapolis. The constitution drawn up at this convention is very similar to that of the American Legion. Important resolutions regarding legislation for disabled soldiers were made.

The convention was opened by National Commander Emory of the American Legion. The members of the American Legion Auxiliary were the guests of the Legion and heard the talks given by General Foch, General Pershing, Admiral Beatty and General Diaz.

The next meeting will be held at New Orleans, Louisiana, about the last of October next year.

**FRUIT SALADS WILL SERVE AS DESSERTS**

**BY SISTER MARY**  
Fruit salad may often be served in place of a dessert. After a dinner that is rich in fats and starches a dessert of fruit is acceptable. The winter salad and dessert are made one and the whole is topped off with black coffee, cheese and crackers.

The fruits that were canned during the summer months may be drained from their sirup and used in many combinations. The sirup should be saved for drinks and sauces for desserts.

**Pear Salad**  
Allow a whole canned pear for each serving. Work a cream cheese smooth with cream. Any of the cream cheeses put up in small packages may be used. Fill the cavities of the pears with the cheese mixture, put two halves together to make a whole pear and serve on lettuce with whipped cream dressing.

**Whipped Cream Dressing**  
Four tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 teaspoon mustard, 2 tablespoons sugar, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 4 tablespoons water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 2 egg yolks, 1 cup whipping cream. Melt butter, add flour, salt, sugar, pepper and mustard, mixed and sifted. Stir till smooth and add vinegar and water. Put over a slow fire and cook, stirring constantly till all is thick and smooth. Take from fire and add yolks of eggs unbeaten, beat well with the spoon. Let cool and add the cream beaten stiff. Mix thoroughly and let stand two or three hours before using.

**Fruit Salad Dressing**  
Four tablespoons pear, peach or pineapple juice, 4 tablespoons lemon juice, 1-3 cup sugar, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs. Beat eggs slightly, just enough to mix whites and yolks. Add sugar, fruit and lemon juice. Cook over hot water stirring constantly until the mixture coats the spoon. Remove from fire and cool.

**Combination Salad**  
One-half cup diced pears 1-2 cup diced peaches, 1-4 diced apples, 1-4 cup diced pineapple, 2 tablespoons preserved cherries, 1-2 cup nuts. Drain pears, peaches and pineapple from their juice. Cut in dice and measure. Drain cherries from juice. Chill ingredients. Mix and serve on lettuce masked with either dressing. The salad should be served as soon as mixed.

**Quince Salad**  
Eight quarters canned quinces, 1 grapefruit, 1-2 pound white grapes, red raspberry jam. Cut quinces in cubes. Remove grapefruit from skin. To do this cut grapefruit in half, cut the center pithy part out with scissors and scoop the pulp out with a strong teaspoon. This way there is no danger of any bitter skin clinging to the pulp. Save the juice. Seed and skin grapes. Arrange fruit in groups on lettuce hearts, putting the quince in the center. Cover quince with whipped cream and put a teaspoonful of the jam on top. Serve plain French dressing with the salad.

To make the cream: Three-quarters cup whipping cream, 3 tablespoons grapefruit juice, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1-4 teaspoon salt, paprika. Beat cream with the fruit juices until stiff. Add salt and paprika and drop on salad.

Ninon was a marvel then—but not today! For every second woman, even yourself, perhaps, is a Ninon who refuses quite refuses, to let the years leave any mark as they pass! Too many little patters and too easy to make soft creams which keep skin youthful and pliant!

There is probably no portion of the body which ages more quickly than the neck. It shows the fine little lines and it sags and gets yellow. So your neck must have a little attention every day. Cream helps. Keeps lines away and the right cream will keep it white. A cream with a bit of almond oil is good and you can make one yourself quite easily. Melt together in a double boiler 2 ounces of spermaceti and an ounce of oil of almonds. Stir in three ounces of glycerin and 1-2 ounce of balsam of Peru.

Remove from the fire and beat until smooth and cool.

This is an excellent cream for use at night before retiring—it softens and whitens.
