

PRIMARIES IN TEXAS TAKE PLACE JULY 22

Second Primary, August 26, Expected to Determine a Few Nominees

SIX OUT FOR SENATOR

Dallas, Texas, July 21.—The Democratic primary in Texas, which will decide many of the Democratic nominees, United States senator, congressmen and the state ticket will be held Saturday, July 22.

For a time James E. Ferguson, of Temple, Texas, former governor, and Mrs. Ferguson, his wife, both filed among the senatorial candidates, and as candidates against each other.

Other candidates for the senatorial nomination are R. L. Henry, of Waco; Earl B. Mayfield, Austin; Clarence Onley, Fort Worth, and Cullen F. Thomas, Dallas.

BRYAN WINNER IN PRIMARIES IN NEBRASKA

Brother of W. J. to be Democratic Gubernatorial Candidate in the Fall

MANY VERY CLOSE RACES

Omaha, Neb., July 21.—Political forces of Nebraska today awaited only definite knowledge as to who had been nominated as Republican candidate for governor at Tuesday's primary election before clearing decks for the November election campaign.

There seemed little doubt among political observers that the scramble of nominees for election will develop into races rivalling in closeness that between Adam McMullen of Beatrice and Charles H. Randall of Randolph Tuesday.

McMullen this morning had a margin of 209 votes with less than 100 precincts missing. The general opinion was that with all 1913 precincts reported the lead of either candidate would be so slender only an official tabulation would determine the winner.

Once again a Bryan becomes a candidate for election to a major political office as a result of the victory Tuesday of Charles W. Bryan, brother of William Jennings Bryan, over Dan B. Butler, in the Democratic gubernatorial race.

HOOVER WILL HELP PREUS

Informs Minnesota Executive of Decision to Aid

St. Paul, July 21.—Complete cooperation of Minnesota with the federal administration "in every possible way" was promised today by Governor Preus in a telegram to Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce. Governor Preus returning to the executive offices this morning, declared that he believed Secretary Hoover would do everything possible to secure priority orders for shipment of coal to the heads of the lakes and that Minnesota will leave nothing undone in aiding the federal authorities in the present emergency.

things are operating normally by August 1, it is apparent that the state will have a shortage of coal this winter.

The governor believes that another ten days will see the normal supply of coal arriving at the head of the lakes but he declared that the state cannot afford to wait too long and will do everything possible to assure large early shipments.

It has been rumored that trains 7 and 8, and branch line trains in this section, may be cancelled, but there is no such information at hand now, and all trains are running. Some of them, however are maintaining irregular schedules.
