

OORANG INDIANS TAKE THE TRAIL
Entire Tribe Off the Reservation. After Scalps on Gridiron

Marion, O., Oct. 18.—Natives of Manhattan are right. Redskins still terrorize the region of Ohio.

Whoever'd have supposed that within a stone's throw of the home of President Warren G. Harding, pow-wow'd a powerful tribe, formed on a union basis by premier members of other tribes, all over everywhere!

Yet 'tis true. Fourteen miles from Marion a coterie of chieftains, averaging about 200 pounds apiece, and possessed of ravenous appetites, makes its home.

What's more, the season has now arrived for this formidable aggregation to sally forth, hunting scalps. And a sight they are too, when they take the war trail—all done up in hideous orange and maroon—the colors of the Oorang Indians in the National Professional Football League.

Gathering from all parts of the United States, the Redskins have been grudgingly daily at LaRue, under the leadership of Jim Thorpe, one of the greatest all-round athletes the world has ever known.

The National Football League of 20 teams includes, besides the Oorang, such elevens as the Chicago Cardinals and Bears, Minneapolis, Cleveland, Buffalo, Milwaukee, Rochester, N. Y.; Columbus, O. and various others. Some of these the Oorang have yet to meet on the field of battle this fall.

Jim Thorpe Leads
It is believed that never before in the history of professional football has such an organization of Indian stars been assembled as Jim Thorpe's.

Thorpe himself, a sensation of the Olympic games at Stockholm, is still engaged actively in more than one form of sport. After a successful baseball season in the Eastern League he autored to LaRue to assume command of the tribesmen gathered there.

Besides Thorpe, two more former captains of Carlisle, are included in the lineup—Joe Guyon and Pete Calac. Walter Camp considered all of these three as members of all-America elevens a few years ago.

Other members of the team are: Attache, of last year's Sherman College team; Long Time Sleep, of Haskell University and the Flathead reservation in Montana; St. Germaine, of Carlisle and Yale; Boutwell, Sanook, Downwind, Busch, Lone Wolf, War Eagle, Running Deer, Strongwind, Big Bear and Thunder, all former Carlisle men.

Mascot a Coyote
The squad mascot is a pet coyote, brought from Montana by Nicholas Lassa, better known as Long Time Sleep.

It's a playful tribe, even when at work. Wrestling matches and long runs are the regular thing. It means nothing to the Indians to make a jaunt on foot into Marion and back a distance of 28 miles. The warriors eat but twice a day. Practice begins at noon and continues until evening, and it's then that the Redskins have their second meal.

The training camp and the clubhouse in which the Indians live is on the Oorang Airedale kennel farm of Walter Longo, chief sponsor of the eleven.

Bismarck registered a 51 to 0 victory over Minot last year, when Minot had about the same team, but it is reported to have improved fully a hundred percent. A great crowd is expected at Saturday's game here.

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FORMER BANK HEAD IS GIVEN 4-YEAR TERM

Judge Miller Criticizes Dishonesty of Man Holding A Public Trust

DEFENDANT WEEPS

Minot, N. D., Oct. 18.—J. C. Peters, former president of the Mohall State bank, now defunct, was sentenced to four years in the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kansas, this forenoon by Judge Andrew Miller in federal court here. W. W. Bergman, former assistant cashier was sentenced to two years in the same prison and Frank W. Wiebe, cashier, to one year and one day in the federal prison. The three defendants each entered pleas of guilty yesterday to charges of using the mails to defraud.

Peter broke down and wept several times during the questioning of the defendants by the court. Bergman and Wiebe appeared stoical and accepted the sentence without any apparent sign of nervousness.

Judge Miller, before passing sentence, severely criticized bank officials who "will deliberately falsify the records, while holding themselves out to the public as honest and trustworthy servants."

Chief Deputy United States Marshal C. R. Wattle's stated at noon that the prisoners probably will not be taken to Leavenworth for several days as the marshal's office is short of assistance. The three will be confined in the county jail until they are removed to Fargo and thence to the Federal prison.

"The whole plan was to get the money of the people," declared District Attorney M. A. Hildreth. "Their operations extended from Puget Sound in the west to Buffalo, N. Y. in the east. The literature which they distributed was deceptive. Much of it was in the nature of letters which were to be found on the desk of the bankers and others."

"I think that of all the cases in this state, this is the worst that I have ever seen, he said.

LOSS IS \$225,000.

Duluth, Minn., Oct. 18.—Fire of unknown origin early today destroyed a three story building downtown, causing a loss of \$225,000 to the building and contents. The building was occupied by the H. B. Knudsen, Automobile Sales Agency which reported a loss of \$150,000. The building was valued at \$75,000. The building and contents were insured for \$167,700.

ROBBED OF \$200.

Minot, N. D., Oct. 17.—Two transient laborers, waiting in Minot for a train which would take them to Seattle where they intended to work, were robbed of about \$200 by three unmasked men on second avenue southwest early this morning. The police were informed this forenoon.
