

YANKS MAY TRADE MEN WITH CHICAGO

New York, Dec. 18.—Miller Huggins, manager of the Yankees, was authorized today for the statement that the much rumored deal which would send Muesel, Ward and Hoyt to the Chicago White Sox in exchange for Eddie Collins, Bib Falk and another Chicago player is "still on."

Leaving for Cincinnati yesterday to spend the holidays Huggins said there was still hope that an agreement might be reached between the Yankees and the White Sox which would result in the triple exchange. He also said that there were indications that the deal by which Mike May, the young pitcher of the Boston club of the Pacific Coast League, would come to the Yankee's camp be completed before the new year.


The condition of Bishop Wm. A. Quayle of the Methodist church, St. Louis, who is critically ill at his home here, was reported today as unchanged.

TEMPERATURES RISING OVER NORTHWEST

Chicago, Dec. 19.—Snow was indicated over the upper Mississippi region from the great lakes to the Rockies, the weather bureau said today in its general forecast, bearing out earlier indications of white Christmas in the northern states of the middlewest. The moderation which set in yesterday following the cold wave in Sunday was more pronounced today, a rise in temperature of 64 degrees having been recorded at Havre, Montana, where the thermometer reading of 28 below zero yesterday had changed to 35 above today.

The coldest point in the country today had switched from Havre, Montana to Wausau, Wisconsin with a reading of 14 below zero although White River, Ontario, with 48 below was the coldest place reported on the continent.

Chicago, Dec. 19.—Slowly rising temperatures today marked the passing of winter's first determined offensive in the lower lakes region, which sent the mercury down to its lowest level of the season.

While slightly warmer weather was forecast for the northwest, plains states and the rocky mountain region cold wave forecasts were issued for Pennsylvania, New York, and the New England states.

Chicago today was recovering from its coldest weather of the year yesterday, when the thermometer was reported variously in the vicinity of three to eleven below. Five deaths and more than 170 complaints of cold flues were attributed to the cold wave.
