WHEAT VALUES BREAK AFTER GOOD START

(By the Associated Press) Chicago, Dec. 20.—Although wheat today touched new high price records for the season, the upturn which took place during the early dealings, was soon more than wiped out. General selling by leading houses that were in a position to realize profits appeared to be the chief reason for the break in values. The advance earlier was ascribed to higher quotations at Liverpool. Opening prices here, which varied from 1/2c to 1 1/2c higher, with May \$1.25 to \$1.26 1/2 and July \$1.15 to \$1.16 1/2, was followed by a sudden drop to about 1/2c cents below yesterday's finish and then by something of a rally. Subsequently, renewed selling carried prices down much lower than before, but indications of export business helped bring about a fresh rally. The close was nervous, 3/4c to 2 1/2c net lower with May \$1.24 to \$1.24 1/2 and July \$1.13 1/2 to \$1.13 3/4. Later, the market recovered somewhat, export business proved an aid. The close was unsettled at 7/8c to 1 1/2c net decline with May 73c to 73 1/2c. Corn and oats paralleled the action of wheat, corn climbing quickly to new top prices for the season, then undergoing a sharp decline. Heavy selling, due to large receipts of corn and to profit taking by holders was in evidence. After opening 5/8c to 5/4c to 5/2c higher, May 75 1/2c to 75c, the corn market hardened a little more, and then underwent a material decline. Oats started 3/4c to 3/2c higher, May 47 1/2c and later showed decided losses. Provisions were upheld by higher quotations on hogs.


