



### GARLINGTON PAYS PENALTY.

Faced Death Without a Falter; But Said Not a Word of His Crime.

Garlington shot through the trap at the Fort Worth jail at 1:49 Friday afternoon, the fall of eight feet breaking his neck. He was pronounced dead in 15 minutes.

The march to the scaffold started at 1:33. Garlington preceded Sheriff Clark and went up the iron steps to the scaffold unaided, with a firm step. He stepped upon the trap door without a falter, where he made a long rambling talk, but never once referred to the crime for which he paid his life today. Facing death he said: "As I stand before God I want to thank the officers of the courts, they have been kind to me, almost like a brother; my friends have stood by my side and my interest was seemingly their interest. I want to especially thank my lawyer who did all he could for me from beginning to end; he had left nothing undone that would add to my case. When time is no more and we stand on the other shore I hope we shall know each other better. I wish to thank Rev. McGaha who has been by my side and administering those things which I might enjoy hereafter; while I know I have sinned against my Father, I will arise and go to Him, and as I stand on the brink of death I forgive all those who have ill treated me. I am the only one of our family who has ever been brought to the scaffold. I desire to thank Sheriff Clark and his assistants, and now will bid you a lasting farewell. I beg God to forgive the governor of Texas if he did wrong in not commuting my sentence. I now commit myself to Him who said:

"Not my will, but thine be done, O! God."

There were at least 200 spectators within the jail to witness the execution, most of whom were officers of the law, while around the jail yard there were several hundred curious people, anxious to catch a glance of even the coffin as it was brought out of the front door of the jail.

The body was cut down, placed in a coffin and turned over to his brother, who came up from Navarro county to receive it.

W. R. Petty became hysterical and had to be removed from in front of the scaffold. The scene to be enacted was too much for his nerves. After the body was cut down the gates of the jails were opened and crowds of people permitted to view the remains.

Garlington was only 26 years of age. He was a native of Texas, and was educated for the ministry at a school in Lampassas county.

The crime for which Jim Garlington, alias Jim Darlington, paid the death penalty today was the murder of Watson Whitaker, the fireman on the southbound passenger train a short distance north of Fort Worth, on the night of July 21, 1898.

### HEROIC FIGHTING.

Regulars Swim Streams, Spanish Prisoners Released—Casualties Light.

Washington, July 28.—The following cablegram was received from Otis today: "Hall, with a thousand men, captured Calamba, an important point, driving out 300 insurgents. The command was composed of a portion of the Fourth cavalry, Twenty-first infantry and Washington volunteers, transported in launches and canoes with a gunboat accompanying. Casualties two killed; one mortally, three seriously and seven slightly wounded. The insurgents' casualties are unknown. Forty Spanish prisoners were released. A Spanish gunboat in good condition which has been long sought for in the bay, was captured. This town was a direct objective point of General Lawton when he captured Santa Cruz and the launches in April, but he was unable to reach the town by boats on account of shoal water."

Manila, July 28.—A force under Captain McGrath of the Twenty-first infantry and Captain Elton-herd landed east of town, but found a river intervening. Captain McGrath and Lieutenant Batson swam the river under the fire from twenty Mauser rifles. Having crossed the stream, the officers procured a canoe to ferry the troops over. The insurgents retreated through the town, shooting from houses and bushes as they fled to the hills. The three members of the Washington regiment waded from the cascos through swamps often shoulder deep, while a group of Filipinos concealed in hay stacks were shooting at them, until the Lapidan focussed her six-pounder and Gatling guns upon the stacks for a few minutes. Most of the work was done before the Washington volunteers could reach the town. The Filipinos left three dead. Of the casualties upon the American side, two of the killed and three of the wounded were members of the Fourth cavalry and two killed and eight wounded belonged to the Twenty-first infantry.

There was not much shooting by Amigos, who emerged from the bushes with white flags. After the fight a dozen men holding up their hands and shouting, "Castilianos," met the American cavalry. Even Spanish soldiers embraced the Americans hysterically. There were fifty Spanish prisoners at Calamba, of whom some were civil officials and some were soldiers. They had been given the choice of joining the Filipino army or becoming servants to Filipinos, and chose the army, intending to surrender at the first opportunity. Most of the civilians reached the American lines during the fighting, but the insurgents took others away with them in their retreat.

### PROGRESSIVE MIAMI.

Bonds Voted Yesterday for \$10,000 School Building.

At a special election held recently in favor of issuing \$10,000 of twenty year six per cent school bond, to be disposed of immediately. Miami is the only town in the Indian Territory where real estate may be sold, and bonds may be regarded as a lien upon the reality, and hence no difficulty will be experienced in selling these bonds at a good premium. A handsome school building will be erected.—Indian Chieftain

### Shamrock's Chances.

London, July 28.—The Yachting World issued today, contains a long article on the Shamrock's chances in the contests for America's cup. Starting upon the assumption that the Vigilant and Britannia were equal, the writer argues that the Shamrock showed herself to be able to beat the Britannia in a moderate breeze, 25 to 26 minutes over a 30 mile course. With time allowance the Shamrock's net superiority would be 15 to 20 minutes. As the Defender's superiority over the vigil in sailing the same course is estimated at six minutes, and the Columbia's superiority over the Defender is assumed to be three minutes, according to the Yachting World's articles, there are excellent grounds for the belief that in the present condition of both yachts, the Shamrock will win.

### An Interesting Case.

Judge John Hinkle, Master in Chancery, has now under advisement the case of Daniels vs Sulphur Springs. Daniels now has in his possession a lot which he and his friends swear he is the lawful owner of but there are other men in the town who swear positively that the lot which Daniels claims is an alley and that Daniels was given an adjoining lot to abandon this one for public purposes. The evidence conflicts on the material point sought for. No impeaching testimony was offered, and for the Judge to give the same weight to the testimony of each side makes it indeed a puzzling question.

### SUSPICIONED FOUL PLAY.

A Careful Investigation by the Neighbors Dispel the Idea.

When the body of Jim Hulsey was found in Caddo creek the other day, where, as reported in the ARDMOREITE, he had lost his life in an effort to cross the stream when swollen, the face and upper portion of the body bore evidence of a nature, which led some to suspicion that the young man had been foully dealt with. The face and neck of the deceased's body was in a bruised and crushed condition when found.

This caused some commotion in the neighborhood and an investigation followed. Not a thing, however, was found in the least bit tending to such a horror. The tracks of the mule where it entered the water with its rider were plainly visible, but no others, and the same lone track showed where the animal had reached the bank down the stream.

It has been concluded that in getting into deep water the mule may have unseated the rider and even kicked the man, which would readily account for the jaw being crushed and the neck bruised.

### Census Dates.

The Commission to the five civilized tribes will be at the places, on the dates named below, for the purpose of taking a census of the Choctaw Indians by blood and Choctaw Freedmen.

Heads of families may enroll the members of their families and minor children who make their homes with them. Guardians may enroll their wards.

Hartshorne—From Tuesday, August 1st to Saturday, August 5th, 1899, inclusive.

Calvin—From Monday, August 7th to Friday August 11th, 1899, inclusive.

Durant—From Monday, August 14th to Friday, August 18th, 1899, inclusive.

Caddo—From Monday, August 21st to Friday, August 25th, 1899, inclusive.

Atoka—From Monday, August, 28th to Saturday, Sept., 2nd, 1899, inclusive.

South McAlester—From Monday Sept., 4th to Wednesday, Sept., 13, 1899, inclusive.

South Canadian—From Thursday, Sept., 14th to Saturday, Sept. 16, 1899, inclusive.
