Bright Future is Pictured for the J. N. Johnnson Tells of the Lines Building and Projected.

J. N. Johnson and C. N. Crawtons een having some very coll weather of Addington, O. T., were here last for the past few days. Today the hight to attend the Hoo-Hoo concatena-

Mr. Johnson told a Register repothat Addington was growing rapidly. and that many people were locating there from Texas.

Speaking of railroad projects in the Territory he said there was much actitvity just at this time, and several his were projected besides those w actually under construction.

When Mr. Johnson left home Monday there was a party of Hock Islano officials in Addington looking over the town, investigating a projected extenilon from Lawton to that place.

Another line that will likely be built tio Addington is the Arkansas and boctaw from Ardmore. The route has not however, been decided on, but it it. definitely known that it will not be the southern route, via Surden as it rould take the line too near the river. would not afford sufficient territory between that route and the river to estify building that way. This is given as a reason for abandoning that A line from Arimore to Addington is the logical one, and will sore than likely be decided on.

The line is graded to Cornish, twenty niles east of Addington. It is to be sulft in a southwesterly direction to Wichita Falls, Tex. about 160 miles distant.

Mr. Johnson said it was only a mater of a few months when the Chickseaw. Creek and Choctaw nations would e opened to settlement. In fact the secretary of the interior had already given notice regarding the completion of allotments to the Indians.
