LETTER FROM WETUMKA.

A Bright Future is Pictured for the
Town and Surrounding Country.
Special to the Ardmoreite.

Wetumka, I. T., Jan. 29.—We have
been having some very cold weather
for the past few days. Today the
ground is covered with snow.

The Young People's Christian En-
deavor Society will give a basket sup-
per next Saturday night, the proceeds
of which will be spent for the pur-
chase of an altar.

Wetumka's first town election was
held yesterday, resulting in the elec-
tion of Mayor F. N. Shires; recorder,
Jas. A. Long; aldermen, J. M. Swift,
A. V. Skelton, J. A. Gofford, E. M.
Roberts and F. S. Williams. As soon
as they are qualified they will enter
upon their duties and we will begin
to reap the benefits of an incorporated
town.

We look with much excitement the
fact that the Choctaw, Oklahoma &
Gulf railroad will build a branch from
some point east of Holdenville to
Guthrie. It is an evident fact that
this road cannot hardly miss Wetum-
ka should it branch from any point
about South McAlester. Even now
there are men from a distance in our
town nearly every day to invest in
real estate, but when we have secur-
ed two railroads and the county seat,
together with the many invitations
which the surrounding rich soil se-
des out, there will be a great field for in-
vestment. It is to be hoped that the
question of our year leases will con-
tinue to be discussed, for as it now
stands it is certainly a great imped-
iment to Wetumka. There are thou-
sands of acres of the richest river bot-
tom and prairie land lying at our
door which presents to the farmer the
unuttered invitation, "Come and the
yield shall be in abundance." But
with long time leases this invitation
will at once be accepted, as a result
of which the allottee will reap good
rentals, the laborer will secure a
home and the country along with our
town will be much improved.

TERRITORY RAILROADS.

J. N. Johnson Tells of the Lines
Building and Projected.

J. N. Johnson and C. N. Crawford
of Ardmore, O. T., were here last
night to attend the Hoo-Hoo celebra-
tion.

Mr. Johnson told a Register report-
er that Ardmore was growing rapidly,
and that many people were locating
there from Texas.

Speaking of railroad projects in the
Territory he said there was much ac-
tivity just at this time, and several
roads were projected besides those
now actually under construction.

When Mr. Johnson left home Mon-
day there was a party of Rock Island
officials in Ardmore looking over the
town, investigating a projected exten-
sion from Lawton to that place.

Another line that will likely be built
into Ardmore is the Arkansas and
Choctaw from Ardmore. The route has
not, however, been decided on, but it is
definitely known that it will not be
the southern route, via Surden as it
would take the line too near the river.
It would not afford sufficient territory
between that route and the river to
justify building that way. This is
given as a reason for abandoning that
route. A line from Ardmore to Ad-
dington is the logical one, and will
more than likely be decided on.

The line is graded to Cornish, twenty
miles east of Ardmore. It is to be
built in a southwesterly direction to
Wichita Falls, Tex., about 160 miles
distant.

Mr. Johnson said it was only a mat-
ter of a few months when the Chick-
saw, Creek and Choctaw nations would
be opened to settlement. In fact the
secretary of the interior had already
given notice regarding the completion
of allotments to the Indians. The ter-
ritory to be opened will be as large
as the state of Ohio, and is said to be
the garden spot of the Indian country,
the land being very fertile and pro-
ductive. Mr. Johnson believes that the
soil of the three nations to be opened
to settlement is much richer than that
of the Comanche and Kiowa reserva-
tions recently opened up by the gov-
ernment.—Fort Worth Register.

OUR SMALLPOX PATIENT.

Comfortably Ensconced at the Pest-
house at City's Expense.

Several days ago the Ardmoreite
spoke of the introduction into our
city of a smallpox patient and spoke
of our trying to get rid of him. But
the patient stuck to us and we still
have him.

It seems that the patient was re-
moved from the pesthouse, but was
dumped at a point not far distant
from Ardmore, and the same night at
midnight the patient made his way
back to our depot, by crawling, for
his feet were too sore to walk.

Our city physician then had the pa-
tient sent out to the pesthouse, and
some wood and provisions taken out
to him. Dr. Moffett left the city Mon-
day and the patient was left at the
pesthouse, with a bad case of small
pox, unattended by nurse or friend.

An Ardmoreite reporter made an
investigation of the matter yesterday
and could find no one who knew any-
thing about the matter.

The mayor was called upon and did
not know whether the patient was at
the pesthouse or not. Dr. Gardner was
seen and he knew nothing of him.

Later in the day Dr. Gardner was
seen and stated that he was then just
from the pest house, that he had been
sent there by the mayor, and he stated
that the sick man was there, had a
genuine case of smallpox and was
unattended by any nurse or help of
any kind. Said he had a few provi-
sions and some wood, and more provi-
sions were sent out to him yesterday
afternoon.

We understand that Dr. Moffett told
some one to tell Dr. Gardner to look
after him while he was absent from
the city, but Dr. Gardner failed to
receive the message.

We are told that this is the only
case of smallpox in the city, and with
the proper diligence we hope there
will be no more of it.
