### TAKE DOWN THOSE SIGNS.

The 5th of March the Limit—Judge Galt Talks.

Some several months ago Alderman Eddleman introduced an ordinance in the City Council requiring everybody to take down all signs that swing, or that reaches across the walk.

The ordinance was read, seemed to meet the approbation of the other aldermen, and passed to its second reading. By some means or other the ordinance got sidetracked and could not be found.

A few weeks ago Mr. Eddleman revived the ordinance and it passed to its third reading.

On the third day of this month the ordinance was again read, and the next regular act would have been to let it be published, after which it would have been in full force and effect. But Mr. Eddleman was considerate; he did not wish to compel our merchants to have to tear down their swinging signs so suddenly, so he made a motion that the ordinance be published, and that the same do not become effective until the 5th day of March, 1932, which was carried.

The object of this article is to notify the public that the ordinance will be put in full force on the date mentioned, and to let you know that the 5th is not far off, and that there is no use in beating around the bush for they must come down.

Now in regard to what kind of a sign will be admissible; no sign will be allowed to project more than 18 inches from the wall or door, and it must be stationary, not a swinging sign; no sign whatever is allowed to span the walk, either below of above the awning; a sign may be painted on or driven to the awning, or house lengthwise with the street.

This is about the extent of what the city will permit as signs.

Judge Galt says the ordinance goes into effect on the 5th and he will proceed to enforce it after that date.

### A FINE PIECE OF WORK.

Twenty-Five Thousand Yards of Rock Moved in Sixty Days.

The big Summit cut, some ten or twelve miles east of here on the C. O. & G. road, the grading of which will be completed by Saturday night, is said to be one of the nicest pieces of railroad grading that has been done in the Territory.

Contractor W. A. Shippey has had the work in charge and it was a part of his contract. The cut is 1100 feet long, thirty-five feet deep at the deepest point, and was all solid rock. It required the removal of 25,000 cubic yards of this rock to make the cut deep enough and wide enough for the

roadbed. This work was done by Mr. Shippey in sixty days, one of the quickest pieces of work of its kind that has ever been accomplished in this country.

D. H. Justus, one of the finest railroad engineers that ever walked a flag, and an employee of the C. O. & G. road, says the work was not only done remarkably quick, but was one of the prettiest pieces of work that he ever saw.

At this big cut, he said, is where Corrigan & Co. thought they would catch him with the track laying from the other end, but they are not in hearing of Shippey.

Mr. Shippey will have his forces in here Monday morning to grade the terminal grounds of the road.

### TERRITORIAL AFFAIRS.

Workers in Washington for Statehood and Public Lands.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 29.—Prof. Boyd, president of the Territorial University is in Washington endeavoring to secure public land for that institution.

Charles Hunter, formerly first sergeant in the president's regiment, called at the White House this morning accompanied by Delegate Flynn. Mr. Hunter received a very warm greeting the president inquiring in regard to his Oklahoma comrades and the nature of his business here. Hunter informed him that he was not an applicant for any office, whereupon the president patted him on the back and exclaimed: "Good, you are an exception to the rule."

Representative Little of Arkansas during the course of a speech today on the Indian appropriation bill discussed the question of statehood for Oklahoma, Arizona, New Mexico and the Indian Territory. He urged statehood for Oklahoma, Arizona and New Mexico, and the establishment of a full territorial form of government for the Indian Territory. He declared that he favored the erection of a state out of Oklahoma and Indian Territory and would do all that he could to secure such a result. His reference to immediate statehood for Oklahoma, Arizona and New Mexico, provoked prolonged applause.

### SAID TO HAVE GLANDERS.

is Contagious. Even to Human Beings Ought to be Shot.

A day or two ago one of our veterinary surgeons brought several mules into town from a railroad camp west of here, and was treating them a case of our wagon yards.

The city authorities learned of their presence, and is of the opinion that the mules have the glanders, which is a contagious disease, not only from one horse to another, but to man, and it is most always fatal. A negro died here with it about two years ago.

Judge Galt, Officer Ledbetter, and City Physician Moffett went to the wagon yard this afternoon to determine what was the trouble with the mules but they had been spirited away.

The gentleman running the yard, was warned to be very careful and have the stalls where the mules were thoroughly fumigated, and "what would be better," said the city physician, "it would be a good idea to cut these stalls off from the others and burn them up."

The public generally don't realize what glanders in stock is. A few years ago the English had to shoot over a thousand head of horses in South Africa on account of this disease prevailing amongst them.

It is to be hoped that the disease may be stamped out where it is, and that no further spread will occur.

### BOERS ROUT SCOTS GRAYS.

Crack British Dragon Regiment Cut to Pieces at Kilpdam.

London, Feb. 29.—A detachment of the Scots Grays (second dragoons), one of Great Britain's crack dragoon regiments has been cut by the Boers at Kilpdam. Major C. W. M. Fielden and Capt. E. Ussher were severely wounded. Two men were killed, six wounded and forty-six captured.

The news was received this morning from Lord Kitchener in a dispatch dated Pretoria, Feb. 19.

The Scots Grays formed a part of Gen. Gilbert-Hamilton's column. The latter, while moving on Nigel Feb. 18, engaged a force of Boers at Kilpdam. The Scots Grays became detached, were surrounded and cut off. Gen. Hamilton was unable to dislodge the Boers from their position, so he continued his march toward Nigel.

The Boers released the Scots Grays who had been made prisoners.
